CELEBRATING 25 YEARS OF EUSA

Memories, Goals, and the Future with Secretary General Matjaz Pecovnik

How did you get involved in EUSA, how it all started?

I started to be involved in EUSA activities in 2000, when the Slovenian University Sports Association (SUSA) organised the first EUSA Executive Committee Meeting in Ljubljana, to which I participated as SUSA Secretary General. In 2001, I took part as the Head of Delegation for Slovenian universities at the first EUSA European Universities Championships. In 2002, we organised the EUSA Championship in Basketball in Koper, and a year after EUSA General Assembly in Ljubljana, where I was elected in the EUSA Executive Committee. I was appointed on position of EUSA Secretary General in 2004.

How do you feel being part of EUSA for 25 years, and what does this milestone (25th Anniversary) mean to you personally?

I am happy and proud to have been a part of EUSA for so many

years, being able to contribute to its development and growth. 25th Anniversary is of course an important milestone, when we can proudly look back to the achievements made so far, but at the same time also the time to set the new direction for the future.

Have the core values of EUSA changed or evolved throughout the years?

With the growth of EUSA's sports and educational activities, our core values have also evolved. The values that now define our organisation range from inclusivity and diversity, social responsibility, fair play, to solidarity, equity, sustainability, volunteering, health and wellbeing. These values shape our events, policies, and initiatives, building a strong and united European university sports community.

What in your opinion has been the most important for the successful development of EUSA over the years? One of the most important things for our development was for sure the board decision in year 2000 to organise our sport events not for the national, but for university teams. Consequently, we have over 500 different universities annually present on our events, and still a huge interest for participation. Another important decision was taken ten years after, when the board decided to organise not only the European Universities Championships, but also the European Universities Games, which are now our main flagship event. Important for our development was also the decision to be actively involved in the European Projects through our EUSA Institute by establishing strong cooperation with our main stakeholders

What's the most rewarding part of being a Secretary General of EUSA?

I often describe EUSA as a family—a community united by a passion for university sport. This family includes members of our Committees, Commissions, and Office, along with representatives of our Member Associations, universities, partners, and volunteers. The chance to connect with people who share these values is one of the most rewarding aspects of this role.

What is a special memory you have in mind that happened within the last 25 years?

My most cherished memory is from the first EUSA European

Universities Championship, held in Serbia and Montenegro in 2001. It was there that I met and fell in love with a volleyball player from the University of Ljubljana. We married soon after. Though we've organized over two hundred championships since, that first one will always hold a special place in my heart.

How would you like to see EUSA continue to impact university sport in Europe?

I have two primary hopes for EUSA. First, that we strengthen our existing partnerships with members, associated members, and partner organizations, while maintaining our active role as a partner of the European Union in educational activities and projects. These partnerships are essential for delivering high-quality university sport and educational events that attract growing numbers of universities and students. Second, that we expand our efforts to reach and support those member associations and universities where university sport needs further development.

What do you wish EUSA for next 25 years?

I wish EUSA another 25 years of unity, success, excellence, further development, fair play, inclusion and diversity, teamwork and solidarity.









7th EUROPEAN UNIVERSITIES GAMES DEBRECEN-MISKOLC 2024

JULY 12-24, 2024

Hungary was the go-to country for the 7th edition of the European Universities Games 2024. Being hosted in two cities, Debrecen and Miskolc, this event represented the largest university multi-sport event in Europe this year.

European University Sports Association (EUSA), in cooperation with the local Organising Committee, including University of Miskolc, University of Debrecen, City of Miskolc, Hungarian University Sports Federation (MEFS) supported by key partners, prepared a memorable event, offering 17 sports, educational, social and cultural activities.

Over 6000 people were directly engaged in the event, recording 4503 participants, representing

400 universities from 36 countries. Over 800 volunteers, from which around 180 of them were international, contributed to the success of the event, and other key people making the event a reality were members of the Organising Committee, EUSA representatives and staff, as well as a strong delegation of referees and judges, many of them nominated through European sport governing bodies.

The European Universities
Games in Debrecen and Miskolc,

represented the largest multisport event in Europe for the year of 2024. The biannual event, started with the official Opening Ceremony held at Miskolc's DVTK Arena on July 12 with the presence of the representatives of the highest authorities of the host country, European University Sports Association (EUSA), VIPs, officials, athletes, and citizens of Miskolc.

During the vibrant Opening Ceremony, a lively atmosphere filled the venue as athletes,

officials, dedicated volunteers, and esteemed guests gathered to celebrate the momentous occasion. The event kicked off with heartfelt welcoming speeches that resonated with enthusiasm, complemented by captivating music performances and engaging audio-visual displays. A breathtaking march pass unfolded before the audience, showcasing approximately 3,700 athletes and officials, each proudly representing their respective universities and embodying

Among the dynamic lineup were 3×3 Basketball, Badminton, Basketball, Beach Handball, Beach Volleyball, Chess, Football, Futsal, Handball, Judo, Karate, Kickboxing, Table Tennis, Taekwondo, Tennis, Volleyball, and Water Polo. Notably, the inclusion of Para Table Tennis highlighted the Games' dedication to inclusivity, welcoming student-athletes with disabilities into the competitive fold. This commitment to diversity fosters a thriving environment, where athletes from all backgrounds can shine on the international stage.

Beyond the exhilarating sports competitions, the Games offered an extensive variety of educational, cultural, and social activities designed to enrich the experience of all participants. Throughout July, numerous engaging educational events took place, including enlightening conferences focused on volunteering, workshops aimed at developing social skills, discussions on the principles of fair play, mental health awareness, dual career pathways, and a suite of fun and educational activities that ensured a well-rounded experience for every attendee.

The Games have also emphasised education, with EUSA Forum held in Debrecen, on the topic of "Synergies in university sports development".

The European University Sports Association (EUSA) passionately champions the vibrant participation of studentathletes, who proudly represent their universities across the diverse landscape of Europe. This initiative embraces a broad spectrum of inclusion, welcoming students and volunteers with disabilities and underscoring a commitment to gender equality. This memorable occasion took place on Wednesday, July 24, at the impressive Nagyerdei Stadium in Debrecen.

The event showcased breathtaking highlights from each of the 17 sports, along with one inclusive sport featured during the 2024 Games Attendees were treated to a captivating preview of what awaits at the next European Universities Games, set to unfold in 2026 in the picturesque city of Salerno, promising even more unforgettable experiences and thrilling competitions.

In the closing speech, EUSA President Adam Roczek, thanked all the present athletes, officials, the members of the organizing committee and officially declared the Games concluded.

The Closing Ceremony, like the Opening Ceremony, was filled with emotions and new beginnings. It included many messages of thanks and happy faces. The audience enjoyed heartfelt speeches and great impressions. They also watched a well-made audio-visual presentation that showcased all the sports featured in the Games.

As the vibrant flag of the **European University Sports** Association (EUSA) was ceremoniously dehoisted, it symbolized the end of an exhilarating chapter in the European Universities Games. With great reverence, the flag was handed over to the enthusiastic next organizers who are set to host the Games in Salerno in 2026. The Closing Ceremony, filled with applause and celebration, marked a moment of unity and sport that brought together athletes from across the continent







The European Universities Games, hosted in the cities of Miskolc and Debrecen, were executed under the esteemed license of EUSA by the diligent collaboration of the University of Miskolc, the University of Debrecen, and the city of Miskolc. This remarkable event was bolstered by the efforts of the EUSA Institute along with numerous partners, ranging from the Ministry of Education and Science to various national and local tourism entities, sports organizations, and media outlets. Additionally, the Games received vital support from the Erasmus+ Programme of the European Union and the International University Sports Federation (FISU), which helped foster the spirit of camaraderie and excellence that epitomizes university sports across Europe.

The 7th edition of the European Universities Games, held under the slogan "More than Games" took place in Debrecen and Miskolc, Hungary between July 12 and 24, 2024. It was the biggest university sport event organized in Hungary so far, with 4503 participants, forming 806 university teams, representing 400 universities from 36 European countries.

Compared to the previous edition of the Games, numbers in participation were a bit higher, showing that the interest in university sport has increased a bit during this period of time.

At the very first edition of the **European Universities Games** in 2012 in Cordoba (ESP), EUSA recorded 2574 participants who represented 154 universities from 32 countries, and two years later in Rotterdam (NFD) 2828 participants representing 174 universities from 34 countries were present. The Games in Zagreb-Rijeka (CRO) in 2016 still holds the record figures, doubling the figures from the first edition of the event, having 5408 participants, representing 388 universities from 40 European countries. The 4th edition of the Games in 2018 in Coimbra (POR), where 4027 participants representing 291 universities from 38 countries were recorded, while the numbers in

participation in 2022 increased to 4458 participants, representing 417 universities from 37 countries.

In 2024, in comparison to the Games in 2022, the numbers showed an increase, since the number of participants was recorded to 4503, coming from 36 countries

The Games in Debrecen and Miskolc, featured 17 sports, and again integrally included participation of student athletes with disabilities. This would not have been possible without the commitment and continued support of the European Paralympic Committee (EPC) and cooperation between EUSA, EPC, our members and participating universities.

EUSA is also happy and proud to continuously integrate sport competitions and disciplines that are offered to male and female participants, promoting gender equality and active participation.

Out of 3597 registered athletes on this edition of the Games, 2098 were men and 1499 were women. That makes 58% of the participants to be male and 42% to be women, showing a 2% increase in the female participation in comparison to the 2022 edition and a steady progress in gender balanced participation.


In terms of participation per sport, Football was again on the top of the list, leading with 477 people participating in the competition, both athletes and officials. The second position was Futsal with 449 participants, while the third position was shared by Volleyball and Basketball with 394 participants.

The best university regarding the results in 2024, was again the University of Zagreb (CRO),

followed by the Hungarian University of Sports Science (HUN) and Vytautas Magnus University (LTU). In terms of participation the most active university is again University of Zagreb (CRO), followed by University of Debrecen (HUN) and the Hungarian University of Sports Science (HUN).

The most successful National University Sports Association at the 2024 Games was Hungarian University Sports Federation (MEFS), followed by the German University Sports Federation (ADH) and Spanish University Sport Committee (CEDU).

The most active National University Sports Association this year regarding the results achieved by their students was the Hungarian University Sports Federation (MEFS), followed by the German University Sports Federation (ADH) and the French University Sport Federation.

3x3 BASKETBALL JULY 12-15, DEBRECEN

232 participants, forming 44 teams of female and male students, representing 36 universities, from 16 countries, gathered in Debrecen, to attend the 3×3 Basketball competition. 3×3 Basketball was one of the most attended and popular sports events for the general public, during the European Universities Games in Debrecen and Miskolc.



In the women's bronze medal match, Szechenyi Istvan University (HUN) defeated Vasyl Stefanyk Precarpathian National University (UKR). The gold medal showdown saw Riga Stradins University (LAT) clinching victory over the University of Valencia (ESP), securing the EUG 2024 3×3 Basketball Championship title and a spot for the 2024 FISU University World Cup 3×3 Basketball in China.

In the men's competition, the Vytautas Magnus University (LTU) earned the bronze medal. The thrilling final match between the University of Ljubljana (SLO) and the Polytechnic University of Bucharest (ROU), saw Romanians achieving the gold medal with a score of 19:18 and a spot for the 2024 FISU University World Cup 3×3 Basketball in China.

Alongside spectacular finals, several important extra awards were presented to recognize outstanding performances and sportsmanship. The Fair Play Awards went to Vasyl Stefanyk Precarpathian National University (UKR) (women) and University of Alicante (ESP) (men).

The winners of the first and second place of both men's and women's competition qualified for the FISU University World Cup in 3×3 Basketball that took place in Xiamen, China, from 22 to 24 November.

EUSA and the city of Salerno, Italy, are looking forward to welcoming student-athletes to the next EUSA 3×3 basketball event during the season of European Universities Championships, to be held from 1st to 5th of August, 2025.





BADMINTON *JULY 19-24, DEBRECEN*

The Badminton competition welcomed a total of 139 participants, representing 20 universities from 14 countries in Debrecen.



The competition of Badminton was played in both men's and women's singles and doubles, as well as in teams and mixed doubles, all of them showing their full willing power and determination to earn a place on the podium.

The Badminton finals at the Fonix Arena brought thrilling competition across singles and doubles events, captivating the audience with intense rallies and skilled play. In the men's doubles final, the University of Miguel Hernandez (ESP) went head-to-head with the University of Strasbourg (FRA), where the French duo, Thomas Baures and Aymeric Torres, showcased exceptional racket skills to secure a commanding 2-0 victory and the gold.

The women's doubles final saw the University of Strasbourg

In the mixed doubles final, Gdansk University of Technology (POL) continued its winning streak, defeating the University of Tartu (EST) and claiming the title as the best mixed doubles team of the tournament.

In four days of competition, fighting with kings and pawns, the best of 50 athletes competing in Chess took home victories and medals.



In total, 65 participants representing 20 universities from 11 countries used their strategic moves and minds to get to the top 3 places of the podium.

In Chess, competitors from both the open and women's categories faced off over four days of intense matches, battling across blitz individual, blitz team, rapid individual, and rapid team tournaments. The competition was fierce, with suspense building right up to the final moves.

In the women's blitz tournament, the Bucharest University of

Economic Studies (ROU) claimed the top spot, finishing just one point ahead of the closely matched Budapest University of Technology and Economics (HUN) and Hungarian University of Sports Science (HUN), both tied with 8 points.

In the open blizz tournament, Vilnius University (LTU) took the first place on the podium, followed by Azerbaijan Sport Academy (AZE) in second place and University of Vienna (AUT) in third place.

In the open rapid competition, Azerbaijan Sport Academy (AZE)







emerged as the champion, while Ozyegin University (TUR) took silver and the Armenian State Institute of Physical Culture and

Sport (ARM) won bronze.





The bronze medal was won by the Corvinus University of Budapest (HUN), which defeated the University of Debrecen in a closely contested game 13-11 for Corvinus.



The European Universities Games in Debrecen-Miskolc, held in July 2024, was a celebration of sport, encompassing not only competitions but also a variety of related activities.

Participants, volunteers, and the public enjoyed a range of social and entertaining events and activities at the multi-sport competition in Debrecen-Miskolc.

Besides the educational events offered during the European Universities Games this year, the program consisted of social, fun, entertaining events, making the free time of the participants interesting and fulfilled with new activities.

Once the European Universities Games started, the accompanying fun events started to roll on, as well.

In Miskolc, participants had the chance to enjoy a palette

of social and entertainment activities, mainly held in the very active Fun Zone. Games like Tekerd, team building activities, "More than style – get your hair braided", the Quarter game, and "More than cheer – Get your TikTok moves on point!", were a few of the activities that kept the athletes and volunteers busy in the free afternoons.

Besides that, one of the most famous and funny activities present, was the so called: "More than a picture! Dare to sit in front of a caricaturist!" when participants had the opportunity to pose and get unique caricature paintings of themselves, creating

another great memory of EUG 2024.

Many Quiz Nights were organized, testing the participants knowledge in different topics related to sport and general knowledge, keeping them on their toes and testing their speed in answering the given questions.

Since the Games overlapped with the UEFA EURO 2024, the Fun Zone was often full of participants watching and cheering for their favourite teams, following the final matches of this competition, in both Miskolc and Debrecen.

The opportunities for the participants to attend dance parties, was not lacking, as well. The thematic Rockwell Nights, hosting different themes of dancing parties, such as: Afro House Party, Single Party, UV Party, Retro Party, Latin Night, RnB Night, Mexican Party, as well as the famous Cave Parties, were part of the fun and social side of the Games in Miskolc.

The Fun Zone and social events in Debrecen offered athletes and participants opportunities for fun and interaction

Participants at Debrecen enjoyed a variety of engaging challenges designed to test their abilities.

Shot power measurement with a goal, display totem, reaction time measurement, and heading game with a totem, were a few challenges that the athletes tried themselves in, winning different

kinds of awards and discovering new skills and results.

In Debrecen, a free gym and fitness activities were offered to use for free in the Debrecen Nagyerdei Station, offering the athletes and participants an additional time and space to be active, train and prepare for their better performance, additionally to their usual training times.

The Aquaticum Beach Party at the Aquaticum Debrecen Strand in Debrecen, was the place where the participants had the chance to go and freshen up in the hot days, enjoying the rich complex of water parks and water slides, having fun and relaxing in the non-competition days.

The famous Water Tower offered the participants a variety of events, such as: movie nights, acoustic musical jam sessions, picnics, lounge music hang outs, and different themes of dance parties and DJ music sets.

In both of the cities, different opportunities for additional physical activity were offered to the participants and volunteers, promoting physical activity and healthy lifestyle, using the infrastructure that was used during the European Universities Games 2024.

In both Debrecen and Miskolc, a promotional stand, selling official merch and gadgets of the European Universities Games 2024, where the participants had the chance to gear themselves up with more memorabilia from the best summer sporting event in 2024.











The European Universities Games Debrecen-Miskolc 2024 featured a rich educational program on volunteerism, university sport, fair play, mental health, and youth engagement, offering participants a unique learning experience.



A series of events, such as workshops, sessions, forum, and other activities took place, focusing on integrating participants and volunteers. The primary aim of these events was to provide participants with valuable insights into different topics, share experiences, and establish a collaborative environment. Experts and facilitators were invited to help implement these activities, which were held at the Fun Zones in

both Debrecen and Miskolc, as well as at volunteering centers. These spaces became hubs for discussion and interaction.

Fair Play was a one of the themes of the educational programme. Workshops on this topic, led by participants of the EUSA Youth Exchange Programme, were held on July 16 in both cities. The workshops focused on ethical behaviour in sports and discussed challenges

like pressure to win, doping, and unsportsmanlike conduct. Participants were encouraged to reflect on their own experiences and think about how they could promote Fair Play in their respective sports.

Mental health was another key focus of the educational programme. Workshops led by ENGSO Youth addressed the intersection of mental wellbeing and sports, especially for young athletes. These sessions provided insights into the growing prevalence of mental health issues among youth and the positive role that sports can play in supporting mental health. Alessia De Iulis, a representative of ENGSO Youth, pointed out the importance of creating healthy environments in sports and offered strategies for fostering mental well-being.

A roundtable debate on July 22 focused on the legacy of sports events. This discussion, split into two parts, brought together key stakeholders and Organising Committee representatives, who discussed how hosting sports events like the European Universities Games can leave

lasting legacies for the host cities and communities. In the second part, NUSAs representatives shared their experiences organising the 2018 and 2022 EUGs. They discussed how their events contributed to facility improvements, human resource development, and greater community engagement.

The programme also featured several insightful discussions, on the topics closely related to EUSA educational activity. Sessions such as "More than Performance – Tools and Tips from a World Champion," "Mindfulness: Mental Health and Youth Work" "More than Education – Double Career!" provided participants with important insights on topics of mental health, mindfulness, balancing sports and academics and many more.

In addition, several workshops covering topics of volunteering, health, feminism, sustainability and social acceptance were also held during the European Universities Games. The Fun Zone played a central role throughout the educational programme, offering a space

where attendees could engage with these discussions and workshops in an interactive and informal environment.

A series of workshops were organised for the volunteers, covering many interesting topics. From a workshop on the topic of sensitizing was organised, presenting the work of assistance dogs for people with disabilities, to presenting foreign cultures present at this multi-sport event, showcasing the international mixture present not only among the athletes, but the volunteers as well. Volunteers had the chance to learn how to form a good CV and how to self manage their time and careers, having a separate focus on the dual career aspect. Great round table with experts and exemplary

guest speakers was offered to the volunteers, as well.

The educational programme at the European Universities Games was a significant part of the event, offering participants the opportunity to explore important issues like Fair Play, mental health, and the long-term impact of sports events. Through workshops, discussions, and roundtable debates, participants gained insights and tools to foster healthier, more inclusive, and sustainable sports environments. The legacy of these activities will continue, contributing to a more positive and engaged university sports community across Europe.







The European Universities Games encompass more than just sports and competition, including education, knowledge transfer, volunteering opportunities, and using sport for broader development.

The Observer Program is one of the programs that mainly aims to give a wider insight into the key organizational matters of the Games, as well as the on spot transfer of knowledge about the process of organizing the European Universities Games to future hosts and interested parties.

In 2024, during the 7th edition of the European Universities Games in Debrecen and Miskolc, the Observer Program took place from July 12-14, having knowhow presentations and visits in both of the cities. The Observer Program offered participants firsthand insight into the European Universities Games, encompassing the event's scope, scale, and organizational complexities. It also facilitated learning, best practice exchange, networking with EUSA staff and stakeholders, and a deeper understanding of the organizational process.

Some of the objectives of the program were to provide a structured tailor-made program for future organizers to observe the implementation of EUG operations in full action, to offer guided visits, briefings,

presentations, and discussions on specific EUG topics and questions.

The Observer Program connects future organizers, candidate cities, NUSAs, sports organizers, and other multi-sport event organizers with experienced staff and past organizers to facilitate learning and knowledge sharing.

The European Universities Games Observer Program in 2024 included delegations from several future host cities and organizations: the University of Salerno (EUG2026), the Croatian Academic Sports Association and the city of Split (EUG2028), and the University of Granada (EUG2030). Representatives from the Rhine-Ruhr 2025 FISU World University Games and the University of Aveiro (Portugal) also participated.

Over three days, the Observer Program, moderated by Natasa Jankovic, provided a comprehensive overview of the Games' organization.

The welcoming message was addressed by Adam Roczek, President of EUSA, and Agnes Ancic Valkai, FISU EC Member and Director of International Relations of MEFS, who greeted the present representatives of the Observer Programme. They both extended a warm welcome and pointed out the importance of the games in terms of building community and the legacy that the Games leave to the student-athlete community and university sport in general.

On the official start of the program, first to have the floor was Matjaz Pecovnik, Secretary General of EUSA, who addressed all participants with an inspiring presentation about the history of EUSA and the philosophy driving the organization of its sports events, joint projects and publications. He referred to past experiences and knowledge gained from organizing the past 6 editions of the European Universities Games and many more European Universities sports events.

From EUSA's side, Sports
Manager Miha Zvan provided
participants with technical
information regarding the
lifecycle of organizing an EUSA
sports event. He illustrated the
timeline of the bidding procedure,
providing useful details regarding
all the different stages of the
process, as well as explaining the
role of the EUSA Technical and
Evaluation Commissions.

The observers got information about EUSA minimum organizational requirements on the standards to be followed regarding accommodation, catering, transportation, medical assistance, sports venues, and all the basic aspects connected to the sports competitions and the logistics of athletes and officials during the EUG. Useful insights regarding rules and regulations referring to all technical aspects of the sports competitions were provided, as defined according to EUSA operational documents.

Representatives from the EUG2024 OC, Laszlo Vegh, Mate Nagyistok and Gyorgy Kovacs had a presentation illustrating some of the key aspects related to the experience of the process of organizing this year's edition of the Games in Debrecen-Miskolc. They provided details related to the various roles and functional areas of the organization, the accreditation process, financial matters, transportation and accommodation issues, safety measures, as well as facilities and sports venue management.

The morning program was then followed in the afternoon by a collective guided tour of the sports venues and competitions currently taking place in Miskolc, including Judo, Kickboxing, Volleyball and Chess. The observers had thus the opportunity to get a first approach to the involving atmosphere of the EUG2024 in Miskolc, also taking part in the Opening Ceremony in the evening before moving to Debrecen for the second day of the programme.

On 13th of July, the attendees of the Observer Program, participated at the EUSA Forum in Debrecen, continuing their visit to the main facilities, part of the European Universities Games 2024. The Observer Program team had the chance to visit accomodation, volunteering center, accreditation center, as well as the sports venues and sports matches.

The third and last day of the programme, held again in Miskolc, has begun with a very fruitful "reflections" session, with several roundtables and Q&A moments. The presentations that followed included knowledge sharing from specific departments: Protocol and Hospitality, Transportation, Marketing, Media and Communication, covering important details, procedures, challenges and best practices.

The daily programme then continued in the afternoon with a final collective guided tour of most of the venues in the University of Miskolc Campus: the observers had the chance to visit the accreditation centre, fun and catering zone, accommodation buildings, volunteer centre and media centre.

The Observer Programme offered a unique chance for those involved in future European Universities Games to see the event firsthand. Participants gained a deep understanding of the Games' scale, complexity, and how everything works together. It also provided a space for learning, sharing ideas, and building connections with EUSA staff and others involved in the Games.









EUROPEAN UNIVERSITIES ROWING CHAMPIONSHIP

AUGUST 29-31 ZAGREB — CROATIA



In 2024, the 14th European Universities Rowing Championship was held in Zagreb, Croatia from 29th to 31st of August, hosting the participation of 393 participants, representing 68 universities, coming from across 17 European countries.



The competition was organised by the Croatian Academic Sports Federation (CASF), with the support of the European University Sports Association (EUSA) and the Zagreb Rowing Association, in partnership with the Ministry of Tourism and Sport of the Republic of Croatia and the Croatian Rowing Federation.

EUSA's presence at the championship included Treasurer Francis Cirianni, Rowing Technical Delegate Lionel Girard, Assistant Technical Delegate Agata Zieleniewska, Sports Manager Miha Zvan, and Sports Officer Eszter Guylas.

The competition showcased extraordinary talent, determina-

tion, and sportsmanship. The competition brought together the best university rowing teams from across Europe, culminating in a series of exciting finals that saw athletes pushing their limits in pursuit of victory.

The most awarded universities were: Szechenyi Istvan University from Hungary with a total of 6 medals, followed by University of Zagreb with 5 medals.

Among the other results, in the Men's Eight Finals A, University of Zagreb (CRO) took the first place at the podium, followed by Eindhoven University of Technology (NED) and Sport University Cologne (GER).

EUROPEAN OPEN UNIVERSITY POWERLIFTING CUP 2024

MARCH 1-3 NANCY - FRANCE

In 2024, 52 Universities participated in this Cup, bringing to the competitions 60 male and 37 female lifters in their teams, breaking 11 university cup records with their strenght and prominence in powerlifting.

The 5th edition of the European Open University Powerlifting Cup 2024 was held in Nancy, France, from March 1st to 3rd.

Athletes competed individually and in teams across six categories. Individual winners were determined using the IPF GL formula, which factors in both lifted weight and bodyweight.

Marie-Jose Van Daal from Erasmus University Rotterdam (NED) took first place in the women's competition, followed by Lea Lucas from Université Paris-Est Créteil (FRA) in second, and Valerie Velemanova from Charles University (CZE) in third. In the men's competition, Thomas Czaplicki from Université Blaise Pascal (FRA) secured first place, with Antonio Perez Barros from Universidad Cardenal Espínola (ESP) in second, and Aloy Iwunze from Fontys University of Applied Sciences Eindhoven (NED) in third.

Team trophies were awarded to the top-performing universities. The University of Ljubljana (SLO) claimed the top spot in the women's team competition with 28 points, followed by Université Blaise Pascal (FRA) with 21 points, and Charles University (CZE) with 15 points.

In the men's team competition, Université Blaise Pascal (FRA) took first place with 17 points, Erasmus University Rotterdam (NED) secured second with 15 points, and the University of Tartu (EST) finished third with 13 points.

The three-day event united student powerlifters dedicated to both intellectual and physical development. More than just a competition focused on records, the Cup aimed to foster a generation of intelligent, openminded, healthy, and strong individuals. The event was held under the auspices of the European Powerlifting Federation

(EPF) and the France Powerlifting Federation (FPF), and under the patronage of the European University Sports Association (EUSA), as an open cup.

EUSA President, Adam Roczek highlighted the importance of such events in promoting unity and athletic excellence, while Vice-Minister of the Ministry of Education, Science and Sports, Aiste Zedelyte-Kaminske, emphasized the role of sports in education and personal development. LSSA President, Indre Celkiene, warmly welcomed the participants and expressed her pride in hosting such a prestigious event in Lithuania.

At this years SELL GAMES, student-athletes had the opportunity to compete in: Basketball, Mini Football,

INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON SUSTAINABILITY AND LEGACY IN SPORT

NOVEMBER 20-21 KYIV - UKRAINE

For the 8th consecutive time, the National University of Ukraine on Physical Education and Sport hosted a traditional scientific forum dedicated to discussions on the social, environmental, economic, and organizational dimensions of sports, issues related to physical culture for children and youth, sports training, and Olympic education, as well as addressing current challenges of sports medicine.

The International Conference on Sustainability and Legacy in Sport: Challenges and Perspectives was held in Kyiv in hybrid format, hosted by the National University of Ukraine on Physical Education and Sport, Ministry of Education and Science of Ukraine, Ministry of Youth and Sport of Ukraine, National Academy of Educational Sciences of Ukraine, under the patronage of the European University Sports Association (EUSA), and the International Council of Sport Science and Physical Education (ICSSPE).

The conference started with the opening remarks by many important guests and individuals, among them Adam Roczek, President of the European University Sports Association (EUSA). As part of the conference's opening remarks, the posthumous Order of Merit was presented in honor of Yevgeniy Imas for his outstanding contributions to university sports, given at the EUSA 25th Anniversary Gala in Vienna.

The programme of the conference then continued with the presentations of the four keynote speakers, among which, on behalf of the European University Sports Association (EUSA), Andrej Pisl, EUSA Projects and Policy Manager, presented the sustainability commitment of European University Sport through the lens of the Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) sustainability model. Participants had the opportunity to hear more about EUSA environmental

sustainability commitments through EUSA Green Policy, sustainable planning of EUSA events, networking, cooperation, partnerships, and projects, as well as in terms of creating more sustainable sport events, as well as the scoop of educational events that EUSA is organising.

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EUSA EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETINGS

The EUSA Executive Committee, responsible for the organization's governance and the execution of General Assembly decisions, met twice in person in 2024. These meetings served to coordinate and review the association's work and ensure its continued progress.

Aveiro (POR)

April 19, 2024

Executive Committee members of the European University Sports Association (EUSA), office staff members, and invited delegates met on 19th of April in Aveiro, Portugal.

The first in-person EC Meeting for 2024 was hosted by the Portuguese Academic Federation of University Sport (FADU) and the University of Aveiro, where EUSA Family members were welcomed by the representative of the hosts – the President of Portuguese Academic Federation of University Sport (FADU), Ricardo Nora.

The EC meeting started with the opening words of EUSA President Adam Roczek, who addressed the importance of the EUG2028 Attribution, remarking once again on the huge opportunity of having as many as three strong Candidate Cities to

host the event. Because of that, the possibility of also attributing the 2030 edition of the Games arose, bringing the opportunity for a double attribution for both the 2028 and 2030 editions of the European Universities Games.

The meeting was then joined by the Candidate Cities' representatives, who drew the order in which the committees proceeded to have the final presentation of their biddings.





Following the draw, the general overview of activities and office report were presented by EUSA Secretary General Matjaz Pecovnik, highlighting the main achievements of the organisation in the past period, pointing out the successful year of 2023 for EUSA and the fully packed event calendar for 2024, which will see the European Universities Games 2024 in Debrecen-Miskolc and the 25th Anniversary Gala in Vienna as its peak appointments.

An overview of the financial report, provisional budget 2023-2024 and details about the EUSA Development Fund 2024 were then presented by EUSA Treasurer Francis Cirianni.

On behalf of the Sports Department, EUSA Sports Manager Miha Zvan reported on the successful first European Universities Winter Championships edition, starting up the agenda. Mr Zvan presented the progress report on the upcoming **European Universities Rowing** Championship 2024, to be held in Ankara, the report for the 2025 season of the European Universities Championship and the provisional plan for the 2027 edition, followed by the

attribution by the EC of the 2027 EUCs to the new hosts.

Projects and initiatives cofunded by the European Union (EU) through the Erasmus+ Programme and European Solidarity Corps (ESC) were presented by EUSA Projects and Policy Manager, Andrej Pisl. EUSA is engaged in several projects and, through its Institute currently leads several EUfunded projects on the topic of good governance, dual career, mental health, and volunteering.

The EC meeting was then wrapped up with progress reports on important upcoming conferences and meetings, as well as the status of the EUSA Associated Members, which reached the 100-milestone number during the occasion.

Vienna (AUT) November 15, 2024

The second Executive Committee meeting was held in Vienna, Austria, leading into the EUSA Conference and 25th Anniversary Gala. Hosted by the Austrian University Sports Organisation, the gathering reflected on EUSA's historic ties to Vienna, where

the organization was founded in

President Adam Roczek expressed gratitude to the hosts, presenting a token of appreciation to Austrian University Sports Organisation President Hemma Angerer.

The Vienna meeting reviewed EUSA's accomplishments, particularly the success of the 7th EUG in Debrecen-Miskolc.

Secretary General Matjaz Pecovnik outlined progress on EUSA's long-term event calendar, financial stability, and achievements in EU projects.

On behalf of the Sports Department, EUSA Sports Manager Miha Zvan and EUSA Event Manager Liam Smith presented a series of reports, starting with the successful **European Universities Rowing** Championship Zagreb 2024 and the calendar of next summer's Championships, along with their attributions, progress reports, and inspection visits. They also covered the extensive EUG 2024, highlighting its key moments, challenges, valuable lessons learned, and lasting legacies.

Education and development initiatives were presented by Education and Development Manager Sara Rozman, focusing on the educational activities linked to EUG 2024, including the EUSA-FISU Seminar and upcoming conferences.

Andrej Pisl, EU Projects and Policy Manager, highlighted EU co-funded projects such as DiscoverU and YouMind, showcasing their impact on youth mobility and career development.

Internal matters, including reports from EUSA commissions and statutory working groups, were also discussed.

A notable highlight was the unveiling of a new branding initiative, underscoring EUSA's commitment to modernization and growth.

The Vienna meeting set the stage for the following day's celebrations, where EUSA members gathered for the EUSA Conference and a gala dinner marking the association's 25th anniversary—a milestone reflecting its ongoing dedication to university sports in Europe.



NUSA COORDINATION MEETING

DEBRECEN - MISKOLC

The Organizing Committee and EUSA held two NUSA coordination meetings uniting representatives from national university sports associations to discuss preparations for the 2024 European Universities Games.

Representatives of national university sports associations (NUSA) gathered twice in Hungary to prepare for the European Universities Games 2024.

The first NUSA Coordination Meeting, held on May 22-23, focused on event planning and infrastructure assessments, while the follow-up meeting on July 11 finalized operational updates and details for the Opening Ceremony.

During the initial May meeting, NUSA members and European University Sports Association (EUSA) representatives attended sessions hosted by the Organizing Committee to gain an overview of the event's logistics and venues. Held in Miskolc's Aurora Hotel, the gathering began with opening addresses from HUSF Secretary General Peter Juhasz, OC Managing Director Szabolcs Biro, and EUSA Sports Manager Miha Zvan, who emphasized teamwork, communication, and the strategic importance of hosting the games across both Debrecen and Miskolc.

Presenters showcased updates on various logistical elements, including accreditation,

transportation, accommodations, and volunteering, as the OC prepared to welcome over 5,000 participants competing in 17 sports.

The first meeting included site visits across both host cities. In Miskolc, representatives toured the University campus, including dormitories, catering facilities, and the DVTK Arena, designated for the Opening Ceremony. On May 23, the delegation travelled to Debrecen for further site inspections, covering sporting venues, accommodation areas, and spaces allocated for NUSA offices, allowing them to inspect key competition areas firsthand.

The second coordination meeting, held in a hybrid setting on July 11, marked a final checkpoint just before the Games' opening. EUSA First Vice-President Haris Pavletic and Secretary General Matjaz Pecovnik welcomed representatives and commended the collaborative efforts to bring the event to life.

They reassured participants that the OC and EUSA were committed to resolving any last-minute issues. MEFS representatives Peter Juhász and Gyorgy Kovacs also expressed their excitement, noting that over 4,700 participants had registered, underscoring the scale of EUG 2024.

This final gathering focused on the logistics of the Opening Ceremony, with organizational leaders reviewing the schedule, transportation, march-past, and ceremonial protocol.

NUSA representatives were invited to encourage full athlete participation.

EUG 2024 is organized under EUSA's license, with collaboration from the Hungarian University Sports Federation (MEFS), the Universities of Debrecen and Miskolc, local municipalities, and supported by Erasmus+. Both coordination meetings provided an essential framework for a smooth and successful event, showing the significance of international cooperation in large-scale university sports events.

NUSA Coordination Webinars

Besides the in person NUSA Coordination meetings, EUSA organised two NUSA coordination webinars online, as well. One was held in March and the other in June, both prior to the Games and in different organisational phases.

Each webinar had approximately 60 participants from 25 countries, representing National University Sports Associations (NUSAs) across Europe. The main objective of the webinars was to provide NUSAs with essential information to help them prepare for the EUG 2024 and to inform them about other important events and projects that EUSA has on-going.

NUSA representatives received reports about the Games, underlying the constant and fruitful communication with NUSAs and participating Universities, the central role of the weekly meeting with the Organising Committee, together

with all the important on-site meetings, supervision and inspection visits. Report

NUSA representatives also received information about the events that followed after the European Universities Games, such as Championships and the 25th EUSA Anniversary Gala, ongoing EUSA projects, and the possibility of becoming an EUSA Associate Member.

EUSA values these webinars as an important opportunity and platform to share key updates with member federations, ensuring continuous communication and the exchange of valuable information.





EUSA FORUMJULY 13 DEBRECEN - HUNGARY



Beyond the sports, cultural, and social events, the European Universities Games 2024 in Debrecen and Miskolc hosted the EUSA Forum: "Synergies in university sport development", as a key educational initiative.

Under the moderation of Andreas Csonka, EUSA Executive Committee Member, the forum addressed the integration of synergies and education, highlighting sport's potential to cultivate leadership in a competitive European context.

Together with invited speakers we explored how organisations, institutions and events organisers

cooperate, both on strategical and project- or event-based level, what are the challenges and what are the opportunities of working together, partnering and networking.

The event was open to all participants of the 2024 European Universities Games, as well as the general public, with no pre-registration needed, and

no participation fee. It was held at the Education Center of the University of Debrecen, on July 13, 2024, followed by the EUSA Reception.

The forum was opened by the presentation of Joerg Foerster, EUSA Vice-President, highlighting the ongoing challenges and the need for further development. He



emphasized that EUSA's greatest honor is to enrich students' lives and shape future generations through sustainable, inclusive projects, showcasing how sport can change the world.

Several speakers from various organizations such as: FISU Executive Committee member, Chair – of the FISU Student Committee, and Director of International Relations at MEFS – Hungarian University Sports Federation, Agnes Ancic Valkai; Alessia de Iulis, Project Coordinator of ENGSO Youth; Prof. Laura Capranica

the President of European
Athletes Student (EAS); Marianna
Pikul from University Sports
Association of Poland; Claudia
Southwell, Junior Manager
Delegation Services Rhine-Ruhr
2025 FISU Games; and Biro
Szabolcs, Managing Director
of the Hungarian University
Sports; addressed crucial topics
like dual careers, empowering
youth development, integrity and
cooperation.

The speeches were followed by a roundtable discussion focusing on leveraging synergies and collaboration for greater efficiency in the youth sector especially focusing on university sports. Joerg Foerster, EUSA Vice - President emphasized sharing knowledge and experience to create platforms within the academic sector and help the university athletes to create opportunities for the future. The roundtable discussion mainly focused on involving youth by seeking their opinions, while ENGSO Youth's Alessia de Iulis discussed improving youth involvement in decision-making processes and creating space for youth empowerment. All the partners concluded with the

common thought that university sports and federations have to be open to fresh ideas, encouraging innovation and new approaches in the circle of youth.

The EUSA Forum effectively demonstrated the significance of collaboration, youth engagement, and leadership development within university sports, paving the way for its continued growth in Europe. The event was supported by the ESOM project, co-funded by the European Union.



EUSA CONVENTION

OCTOBER 10-13 SALERNO

The beautiful coastal city of Salerno, Italy, welcomed delegates to the EUSA Convention from October 10-13, 2024, as part of the preparations for the 2025 European Universities Championships.

The EUSA Convention, an annual training program, gathers organizers of upcoming European Universities Championships and Games, along with Technical Delegates and the EUSA Sports Department, to discuss all facets of event organization.

This year, EUSA and FISU representatives, EUSA Technical Delegates, future Organizing Committees of the upcoming European Universities Championships 2025, and other delegates gathered in Salerno, Italy for a joint event, including EUSA Convention and EUSA-

FISU Seminar. These two events were organised simultaneously for the very first time in the city of the next European Universities Games 2026.

On the first day, the official opening of the Convention started with the welcome remarks by Lorenzo Lentini, CUS Salerno President and President of the European Universities Games Salerno 2026. The opening was also addressed by Adam Roczek, EUSA President, and Leonz Eder, FISU President, who emphasized the great growth of university sport across Europe and highlighted the

importance of these events for university sport communities.

The first part of the day was dedicated to EUSA-FISU Seminar, and the Convention official program started with a panel discussion moderated by Eszter Gulyas, EUSA Sports Coordinator, focusing on the "Lessons Learned" from the EUSA Games in 2024 and European Universities Championships in 2023.

The speakers of the panel included Haris Pavletic, EUSA 1st Vice President, Bruno Barracosa, EUSA Vice President, Marianna Pikul, AZS International Relations

Department, and Peter Juhasz, MEFS Secretary General, who shared their perspectives on the topics including legacy of these events, the roles of volunteers and officials, and the meaning of the European Universities Games as one of the university sports events on European level. The discussion also delved into the organizational elements of the European Universities Championships, examining successful case studies and challenges faced, as well as the possibility of implementation of new sports on the EUSA sports programme.



On October 11th, the programme of EUSA Convention moved to the University of Salerno, where the participants were welcomed by Maurizio Sibilio, Vice-Rector of the University of Salerno and Fulvio Bonavitacola. Vice-President of the Campania Region. Lorenzo Lentini once again expressed his pride in hosting the event, while Matjaz Pecovnik, EUSA Secretary General, extended special thanks to the Technical Delegates and Organising Committees for the ongoing contributions to EUSA's mission.

The program of the day continued with a series of presentations designed to provide a comprehensive overview of the guidelines for organizing future European Universities Championships 2025. Topics included regulations, project management, communication strategies, volunteer programs, results management, registration systems, and hospitality protocols. All these topics were presented by the EUSA Office Staff, who shared their insights into details of organising a successful event.

The Convention also featured examples of best practices from the previous editions of EUSA sports events. Pablo Martinez Martinez, EUSA Technical Delegate for Volleyball presented the 2023 European Universities Championship of Volleyball organized in Braga, Portugal as a best practice example. Jordi Mercade Torres presented the European Universities Championship in Tennis, organized in Granada, Spain in 2023, as a best practice in terms of sustainable way of organizing an EUSA event.

In the afternoon, attendees had a chance to visit Paestum, an ancient Greek-Roman city known for its well-preserved temples. This excursion provided a unique cultural experience to complement the Convention's busy program. The day ended with a dinner, allowing participants to further network and discuss their ideas for the university sports.

On the third day, participants took part in a #BeActive sport activity, a well-paced run around





the coast and the historical port of Salerno. This active start of the day was followed by sessions dedicated to the upcoming EUSA Championships. The Organizing Committees presented their plans, and discussions focused on how EUSA as their partner can support the successful delivery of these events. A session on EU funding for university sports projects highlighted opportunities for collaboration and growth, with case studies from the Erasmus+ program. Simultaneously, internal meetings

between Technical Delegates and Organizing Committees took place, marking the beginning of the collaborative work that will lead to the successful realization of the 2025 Championships.

The Convention concluded with closing remarks from Mr. Roczek and Mr. Eder, who expressed their appreciation for the successful collaboration between EUSA, FISU, and the local organizers. A dinner held on the rooftop of the Grand Hotel Salerno served as a fitting end to the event, where gratitude was

expressed for the hospitality and support from the University of Salerno, CUS Salerno, and FISU.

These events were supported by FISU and also co-funded by the European Union, set to play a key role in shaping the future of university sport in Europe.





EUSA-FISU SEMINAR

OCTOBER 10-13 SALERNO

The EUSA-FISU Seminar, held alongside the EUSA Convention in Salerno, provided a crucial platform for shaping the future of university sport and strengthening collaboration between EUSA and FISU.



After a warm welcome from Lorenzo Lentini, CUS Salerno President and FISU Executive Committee Member, Adam Roczek, EUSA President and Leonz Eder, FISU President, who underscored the importance of collaboration between EUSA and FISU in shaping the future of university sports across Europe, the Seminar kicked off.

The official programme was moderated by Sara Rozman, EUSA Education and Development Manager, and started with the first two presentations of What's Up EUSA and What's Up FISU.

On behalf of EUSA, Matjaz Pecovnik, EUSA Secretary General, provided an overview of EUSA's initiatives, ranging from sports events to educational programs and expressed great pride in the diversity and importance of teamwork, while presenting the EUSA Office team.

FISU Projects and Activities were presented by Fernando Parente, FISU Development & Healthy Campus Director, and Tarmo Jaakson, FISU Development & NUSF Relations Manager, including FISU upcoming events, their strategy, and their programmes among which the Healthy Campus, the Step-Up programme 2025, and the CUSF Financial Support programme.

On October 11th, the EUSA FISU Seminar continued at the University of Salerno, primarily focusing on the EUSA Games and Championships, with all FISU representatives present throughout the day to engage in discussions on various topics.

The final day of the seminar was marked by a #BeActive sport activity along the coast of Salerno, which provided a healthy and energizing start to the day. On this day the discussions turned to the future of EUSA and FISU Games. Tarmo Jaakson, presented the Winter World University Games Torino 2025, and Joerg Foerster, President of the German University Sports Federation (ADH), presented the Summer World University Games Rhine Ruhr 2025

Lorenzo Lentini and Francis M. M. Cirianni, EUSA Treasurer, presented the next edition of the European Universities Games, taking place in Salerno in 2026.

Representatives from the Split 2028 and Granada 2030 editions of the European Universities Games, Jelena Matesic and Jordi Mercade Torres, gave us the first insights into what is planned for the future of the Games.

The panel discussion on the topic of universities and their placement in EUSA and FISU was the part that concluded the official programme of these two events.

and FISU's Healthy Campus initiative.

EUSA President Adam Roczek and FISU President Leonz Eder concluded the EUSA Convention and EUSA-FISU Seminar, emphasizing their continuous collaboration in shaping the future of university sport.

At the EUSA Convention and EUSA – FISU Seminar, EUSA Office was represented by Matjaz Pecovnik, EUSA Secretary General; Miha Zvan, Sports Manager; Eszter Gulyas, Sports Coordinator; Liam Smith, Events Manager; Aleksandra Andreeva, Sports Administrator; Andrej Pisl, Projects and Policy Manager, Sara Rozman, Education and Development Manager; Marta Studzinska, Education Officer; Salvatore Sisca, Head of Media and Communications;

and Hristina Hristova, Communications Officer.

The events concluded with the official dinner held on the rooftop of the Grand Hotel Salerno, serving as the occasion for the final moments of gratitude expressed towards the hosts, EUSA family, FISU representatives, NUSA, and partners. EUSA CONFERENCE

NOVEMBER 16 VIENNA, AUSTRIA

The 2024 EUSA Conference was held at the University of Vienna, Austria, on November 16th, co-organized by the Austrian University Sports Organisation and University of Vienna.

Over 150 participants from all over Europe, as well as guests from visiting countries and continents, were in attendance at the event, held on the occasion of the 25th anniversary of the

The conference was opened with welcoming words both in person and via video messages, by Adam Roczek, EUSA President; Martin Polaschek, Federal Minister for Education, Science and Research; Nikolaus Hautsch, Vice-Rector of the University of Vienna; Leonz Eder, President of the International University Sports Federation; and Spyros

Capralos, President of the European Olympic Committees.

First to open the content part of the Conference was Matjaz Pecovnik, EUSA Secretary General, who in a #BeActive way while cycling reminisced about the journey of EUSA and highlighted each of the past 25 years of work, success, milestones, and achievements.

The endeavours of EUSA had challenges and changes that as

well were part of what paved the road for the European University Sports Association to be celebrating 25 years of existence.



The guests shared part of their storylines, achievements, challenges, and positive notes that perfectly describe the path between the mission and reality, mainly in the university sports world and sports in general.

To further enrich the understanding of the role of university sports, the host institution of today's event, the University of Vienna, as a long-

The following session brought the second-round table, this time covering the topic of University Sports, as grassroots and healthy sports. The speakers, Elmar Pichl, General Director for Universities in the Federal Ministry of Education, Science, and Research; Siegfried Walch, Professor at MCI Entrepreneurial School Innsbruck; and Julia Pocksteiner, student and athlete, gave their insights and standpoints, discussing mainly the needs of the students and how the university sports are and can contribute to meet these needs and offer greater support.

This round table was moderated by Arnold Baca, Head of the Centre for Sports Science and University Sports at the University of Vienna.

After the insightful and engaging discussions that underscored the importance of university sports in fostering both physical health and student engagement, we had the privilege to acknowledge and celebrate the achievements and contributions of individuals, universities, and associations whose recent impact on European University Sport deserves recognition and praise.



Equality, respect, inclusion, fair play, and sportsmanship are core values upheld by the European University Sports Association at all its events, ensuring a positive experience for student-athletes.

Gender

All EUSA's sporting events are inclusive of all genders, and this is something that EUSA does not take for granted and something that the association is extremely proud of. Having said this, reflecting on the gender balance of the European Universities Games 2024 participants, athletes, coaches, and officials, we can say that 58% of the athletes were men and 42% of the athletes were women. When it comes to the officials, 79% were men and 21% were women. Although the ratio is tending to improve with every upcoming year, we acknowledge there is more to be done, and we strive to continue the road towards a more balanced participation of male and female participants at EUSA future events.

Socio-Economic Status

To strengthen and support its member federations, the national university sports bodies across Europe, so the organization and conditions of each of our members are very diverse, is remaining one of the aims of EUSA. Recognizing the fact that not all EUSA members have the same funding opportunities, the decision to launch a development fund was made, aiming to develop and make university sport throughout Europe stronger.

With the support of the Club of Donors, EUSA is able to secure a development fund for each year, planned to be distributed primarily to those with little or no participation in EUSA events in recent years. In 2024, this helping body donated its resources to the solidarity fund, used to support the athletes coming from undeveloped member countries and increase the number of athletes participating in the EUSA European Universities Games.

Disabilities

Since the inclusion of athletes with disabilities for the first time in the European Universities Games in 2016, EUSA has continued to

search for ways to build a more open path for inclusivity in our events. Following the inclusion of Para Table Tennis at the last European Universities Games in 2026, EUSA, together with the organizers, plan to include Inclusive Show Dance and Sitting Volleyball into the sport program of next year's European Universities Games in Salerno, Italy.

EUSA recognizes that university sport can still make great improvements regarding the inclusion of all students into sports, and with partners as the European Paralympic Committee, we strongly believe we will continue making progress and changes in the future.

FAIR PLAY

With the European Fair Play Movement (EFPM) as our partner, EUSA strongly promotes the spirit of fair play at all our events, having its values deeply embedded in EUSA, while we are emphasising the importance of sportsmanship and the positive approach to sport across our 20+ years of existence.

Fair play is present in sports as the unwritten rule, a moral value that represents the real essence of sport. It represents that opponents must be appreciated and in nowadays practising of sports, more than ever, it is vitally important to defend the values intrinsic to sport: respect for oneself and others, solidarity, and fair play.

European University Sports Association (EUSA) is an official partner of the European Fair Play Movement (EFPM), who is a member of the International Fair Play Committee (IFPC). The values of fair play, equality, ethics, and clean sport without doping and without match-fixing are at the core of EUSA sport and other events.

The fair play initiative was strongly encouraged at the European Universities Games in Debrecen and Miskolc this year, and apart from having positive messages involving fair play oaths red by athletes and referees at all sports events, multiple fair play awards were given across the present competitions.

At this year's European Universities Games, the Fair Play award was presented for technical aspects of the games at various medal ceremonies in basketball, football, futsal, handball, volleyball, beach handball and 3×3 basketball.

Regardless of the sport, the officials and athletes may nominate an individual or tam for the special Enno Harms award, which is given annually by EUSA for special fair play gestures and attitude.

In 2024, the International Fair Play Committee with great pride, commemorated and honoured with a celebration, its 60th anniversary during the Paris 2024 Olympic & Paralympic Games, in the company of exemplary athletes gathered from all over the world.

The undisputed mission of our entity, in and outside of the Olympic Movement, is to foster, promote and protect the core value of sport that is equal, clean, and safe sport in general, and fair play in particular in line with the Olympic Primary Principle of participating in sport as a human right for both men and women. At the celebration, great emphasis was given on the duty to protect the foundation of sport: fair play, fair competition and fair playing field across all sports and for the benefit of all participants of global sport and the Olympic Movement.

EUSA has always awarded exemplary behaviour on the sports field and will continue with the same practice and vision, that through sport and values like fair play, following the respect for both written and unwritten rules, equality, integrity, solidarity, tolerance, care, and joy, we can contribute to building a peaceful society and ultimately a better future

The fair play initiative will also be strongly encouraged at all competitions during the European Universities Championships 2025.







EUSA EXHIBITION

EUSA initially launched an exhibition on university sport in Europe 2014, supported by the International University Sport Federation (FISU) and by the Erasmus+ Programme of the European Union. EUSA Exhibition is providing an overview of the development of university sport, with a special focus on the European context.

The EUSA exhibition features seven stand-alone panels in the form of towers, grouping contents on the topics of: University Sport in Europe, European University Sports Association, European Universities Championships, European Universities Games, Education and Social Responsibility, Honouring the Best, and Partnership and Future Programme.

Since the first reveal in 2014, the exhibition has traveled extensively around Europe, being in Austria, Croatia, Estonia, Germany, Hungary, Italy, Lithuania, Poland, Portugal, Slovenia, and Switzerland. The exhibition has also been on display as part of various FISU events, including the Universiades and General Assemblies

This year, the exhibition made its way to Hungary, in Miskolc, where it was on display during the European Universities Games 2024. The exhibition was placed at main lobby of the University of Miskolc, which during the Games was also serving as the welcome point and accreditation center.

Being on display, many students and student athletes had the opportunity to see it, offering a showcase of past and present work done in different fields such as European Universities Games and Championships, international projects, educational activities, campaigns, and more achievements of the fast-growing organization and development of university sport in Europe.

VOLUNTEER PROGRAM

The European University Sports Association (EUSA), in cooperation with its Student Commission and the Organising Committees of the European Universities Games and European Universities Championships, is offering students from Europe, a unique opportunity of actively participation in the organisational and hosting process of EUSA events as volunteers.

The European Universities Games in Debrecen and Miskolc, hosted over 800 volunteers, both local and international, that made a great contribution in the success of the event.

Around 180 international volunteers were part of the big group of enthusiastic young people that were engaged in different roles, positions taking care of different tasks, forming this big support system for all the participants and the Organizing Committee, in the implementation of the Games, in both of the cities.

The main aim of the programme is to give a chance to individuals who are interested in sports and in organizing sport events to get the opportunity of experiencing a unique adventure, through which they will learn about the values of sport, gain valuable work experience, express their

creativity, and enjoy everything that EUSA events, as a diverse hub of cultures and people, can offer.

The Volunteer Program includes working for the organising committee, supporting them in cooperation fields such as: coordination, managing information desks, communication and media, as well as being the link between the OC and different groups of people involved in the event: athletes, officials, referees, and other guests. Some of the volunteers are able to closely work with the EUSA staff members present at the events, divided into separate departments.

All these positions available for the volunteers and the experience they get from representing them, are building up the volunteers' competencies and skills, and provide them a certain level of knowledge in organizing sport events at a European level.

In the frame of the programme, full board is provided during the time of the event (and training), with transfer from the official airport/station covered, uniform, insurance, and training. The volunteers only must ensure their travel costs to the event.

Moreover, after the event finishes, a certificate of participation will be provided, indicating their working position and hours, representing their success and an additional value to their already rich experience.

During the 7th edition of the European Universities Games in Debrecen and Miskolc, the tradition of offering the volunteers interesting activities, workshops, and social activities was kept, bringing added value with the educational opportunities throughout their service.

Different workshops on the topic of career, importance of sports, mental health, dual career, legacy in sports, youth participation, were part of the diverse palette of the learning process offered to the volunteers.

In 2025, students can participate and support the organisers of the European Universities Championships, including 18 events, covering 24 sports, spread out in 8 European countries, in different cities.

Best University

The best university is determined by the sports

achievements and results in EUSA competitions. Each team taking part in team sports of the European Universities Games or Championships gets points for their university when they participate. The final ranking represents a sum of all results, and points are given to each university.

Most active NUSA

The most active National University Sports Association is determined by participation of teams and number of participants in the European Universities Games or Championships. Additional points are given for organization of EUSA events.

Most Successful NUSA

The most successful National University Sports Association is determined by the results and final placement of the university's athletes in the European Universities Games or Championships.

Enno Harms Fair Play

EUSA annually awards the recognition for Fair Play, taking into account the play's gesture/ situation during the EUSA sporting events which stand out

the most. Enno Harms Fair Play Award is named after the first EUSA President who was very much devoted to fair play.

EUROPEAN WEEK OF SPORT (EWOS)





The European Week of Sport (EWOS) and #BeActive campaign, initiated by the European Commission, promote sport and physical activity across Europe. EUSA, along with national coordinators and partners, aims to improve health and strengthen the continent based on shared values.

The emphasis of the European Week of Sport is that sport, recreation, and physical activity are for everyone, regardless of age, background, or fitness level. With a focus on grassroots initiatives the European Commission, national coordinators and partners strive to inspire Europeans to #BeActive on a regular basis and to create opportunities in peoples' everyday lives to be more active.

Every year from 23 to 30 September, the European Week of Sport promotes more active, healthier lifestyles to millions of people in Europe and beyond. This year the International Day of University Sports joined the global Olympic initiative #LetsMove.

The official opening of the European Week of Sport was carried out on in Budapest, in cooperation of the Hungarian Presidency of the Council of the European Union and the European Commission.

Hungarian capital hosted the opening ceremony of the

European Week of Sport at the occasion of the LED run, taking place on September 23 at the National Athletics Centre, where a newly built community sporting facility opened its doors for the general public.

The event was opened by Adam Schmidt, Hungarian State Secretary for Sport; Georg Hausler, Director of Culture, Creativity and Sport at the European Commission; and Gabor Balogh, President of the National School, University and Leisure Sport Federation, followed by the hundreds of recreational runners taking part in the symbolic race.

On September 24, the high-level Ministerial and International Conference on the Legacy of Major Sporting Events took place at Varkert Bazar in Budapest, gathering sport leaders, policy makers, and representatives from the European sport organisations and community. The event served as a platform for structured dialogue and collaboration aimed at advancing the mission and legacy of the Olympic and Paralympic Games in the modern era.

European University Sports Association (EUSA) is an official partner of the European Week of Sport and #BeActive campaign. EUSA was represented at the events in Budapest by its Projects and Policy Manager Andrej Pisl and Sports Coordinator Eszter Gulyas.

The European Week of Sport is celebrated across Europe. In Ljubljana, Slovenia – the home of the EUSA Office and EUSA Institute, the opening of the European Week of sport is also combined with the celebrations of the Slovenian Day of Sport on September 23. EUSA staff and volunteers were also attending the events in Ljubljana, after kicking off the celebrations with #LetsIDUS #BeActive team building.

As every year, also this year, the European University Sports Association (EUSA) office employees and volunteers celebrated the start of the European Week of Sport (#BeActive, #HealthyLifestyle4All and #LetsIDUS) with an #beactive cycling activity in the

area of Slovenj Gradec, a cycling scenery path through the valley of the Mislinja River.

This primary goal of this twoday team building was to get to know each other better, enhance social relations, and motivation, as well as to emphasise the importance of being physically active, enjoying and preserving nature, and creating bonding experiences through doing sports and recreation.

The celebration was continued with individual sporting activities done by the EUSA staff and volunteers, to mark the #beactive campaign and continue the active spirit even beyond the official celebrations.

During the occasion of EUSA Convention and EUSA-FISU Seminar, the European University Sports Association (EUSA) made an extended celebration to these two initiatives engaging members of the Executive Committee, EUSA Staff and EUSA events participants, representatives of Member Federations, FISU representatives and other partners.

The EU Sport Forum is an annual event organised by the European Commission in support of the continuous dialogue with the European and international sport community, serving as a central meeting point between sport organisations, representatives of the EU Institutions and Member States exchanging views on the current and future sport policies.

The traditional EU Sport Forum, key annual event supporting dialogue within the European sport community, was held in Liege, Belgium on April 16 and 17, 2024.

The event was organised by the European Commission, in cooperation with the Belgian Presidency of the Council of the European Union, with key sport and sport-related organisations, institutions and decision-makers in attendance. EUSA was represented at the event by Andrej Pisl, Projects and Policy Manager.

In the run-up to the Paris 2024 Olympic Games, the European sports community at the Forum discussed integrity, sustainability, youth in a digital age, and gender equality. The event promoted the exchange of perspectives on sports policies, contributing to the collective advancement of the European sports landscape. Brainstorming and exchange

sessions also took place for stakeholders to support the EU in formulating its future sports policies.

Official opening with welcome addresses and speeches were given by Iliana Ivanova, European Commissioner for Innovation, Research, Culture, Education and Youth; Pierre-Yves Jeholet, Alternate Minister-President of the Government of the Federation Wallonia-Brussels; and Tomasz Frankowski, Member of the European Parliament, and Co-Chair Sport Group in the European Parliament.

The event was kicked off with the keynote speeches made by Jean-Michel Saive, Olympian, and President of the Belgian Olympic Committee; and Samuel Ducroquet, Ambassador for Sport, French Ministry for Europe and Foreign Affairs.

The first high-level panel focused on Paris2024 Olympics and

UEFA EURO 2024 as vehicles for EU values, where the panellists discussed various topics related to these mega sports events hosted in Europe this summer.

The EU Sport Forum was also used as an occasion to present the #Belnclusive EU Sport Awards. All finalists were recognised in 3 key categories. The awards were received by: Urban Youth Games by Olympic Urban Festival, Belgium in category Breaking Barriers, DIF get2sport by Danish Olympic Committee and Sports Confederation, Denmark in category BeEqual and Together4Ukraine by Champions Factory, Bulgaria in category Sport for Peace.

In the afternoon, several parallel sessions were held; starting with Fair Play – Integrity and values of athletes; Women in sport; Green and sustainable sport; Youth and health in the digital age; Athletes' rights.

The second day started with a high-level panel: Dialogue on new perspectives for the European football ecosystem, followed by parallel session focused on Lifelong sport; and Harvesting ideas for the future of EU sport policy.

The last full session was focused on Commission presentation on priorities and developments in EU sport policy and Erasmus+; presented by Floor van Houdt, Head of Sport Unit, DG EAC of the European Commission and Luciano di Fonzo, Acting Head of Unit for Erasmus Mundus and Sport, Education and Culture Executive Agency.

SHARE 2.0 INITIATIVE

Launched in February 2024, the European Commission-funded SHARE 2.0 builds on SHARE (2018-2023), shifting focus from raising awareness to fostering collaboration and knowledge exchange. It emphasizes funding, health, innovation, green sport, and sustainability, while also helping identify EU funding to advance these areas.

The initiative's core activities are organised through Communities of Practice (CoPs), where stakeholders, including public authorities, grassroots sports organisations, federations, nongovernmental organisations and policy experts, come together to share good practices, identify challenges, and collaborate on solutions. The SHARE 2.0 was introduced on the online meeting, attended by representatives from different organizations, with EUSA amongst them, represented by Andrej Pisl, EUSA Project and Policy Manager. Four major CoP have been defined, with the European University Sports Association (EUSA) being invited to take part in the steering group on CoP on Health.

In April 2024, the Health CoP held its first working meeting, focusing on key health-related challenges in sports. Thereafter, the initiative hosted a capacitybuilding event on Green and Sustainable Sport in June 2024, which highlighted sustainable initiatives and educational activities like exhibitions and conferences. Participants engaged in discussions, sharing insights and learning from one another's experiences.

In July and September 2024, next online events focused on the CoPs for Health and Funding took place, allowing for further exchange of ideas and best practices. A significant milestone for SHARE 2.0 was its involvement in the European Commission's 2024 Annual Conference, held in Brussels on September 11, 2024. The event brought together members of the initiative, including EUSA, for discussions on key topics such as innovation, health, and sustainability in sports.

EUSA's participation in SHARE 2.0, being a part of the Health CoP, contributed to discussions on promoting physical activity for better health and longer life, and addressing youth mental health. By contributing to these sessions, EUSA is helping shape the overall recommendations of the initiative, emphasizing the importance and positive impact of sports on health and wellbeing.

As SHARE 2.0 progresses, the initiative remains committed to fostering cross-sector collaboration, sharing knowledge, and driving sustainable development in the field of sports and physical activity across Europe. Through its Communities of Practice, SHARE 2.0 aims to create lasing change that will benefit communities at the local, regional, national, and European level.

EUROPEAN SOLIDARITY CORPS (ESC)

The European University Sports Association, through its EUSA Institute, is an accredited organisation with a Quality Label for running European Solidarity Corps (ESC) activities in Volunteering and Solidarity projects, supported by the European Union.

The European Solidarity Corps replaced the European Voluntary Service as a new initiative which creates opportunities for young people to volunteer or work on projects that benefit communities and people around Europe, either on their own or in a country abroad.

The European Solidarity Corps (ESC) aims to foster solidarity in European society, engaging young people and organisations in accessible and high-quality solidarity activities. It offers

young people opportunities to show solidarity and help resolve challenging situations across Europe through volunteering activities, traineeships or jobs as well as solidarity projects based on young people's own initiative.

The ESC position in EUSA is open to motivated individuals aged between 17 and 30, as a long-term placement, usually for a period of 12 months.

In recent years, volunteers from France, Hungary, Germany,

United Kingdom, Italy, Ireland, Russia, Poland, Croatia, Spain and Malta have benefitted from this experience as assistants in the EUSA Office.

The selected volunteers are based in Ljubljana, for one year period and assist various spheres of EUSA related projects and activities. During the experience, the volunteers are receiving constant support and assistance in all fields of life, as well as empowerment to learn new things, be part of different

experiences and get great knowledge.

In the year of 2024, EUSA had the pleasure to welcome and host, two sets of European Solidarity Corps Volunteers. From October (2023) until August (2024), in the EUSA office in Ljubljana, Marta, Emanuele and Heloise had their 11 months experience and journey, full of activities, learning, different tasks and knowledgeable days. For the period of 3 months, EUSA Office

as well hosted Jennifer, for a shorter version of ESC journey.

In the recap of their journey with EUSA, this is what they expressed:

"My expectations were met and often exceeded! The welcoming atmosphere and support of the EUSA Family, different activities, and the chance to travel and meet people from various backgrounds made this time interesting and fulfilling. From daily office work to volunteering at major sports events, the experience was varied and rewarding. YOUTH INTEGRITY AMBASSADORS PROGRAMME (YIAP)

The Youth Integrity Ambassadors Programme (YIAP) project was concluded in Malmo, Sweden with two consecutive events: the Evaluation Course and the European Final Conference from 26th to 28th of February, hosted by the Swedish Sports Confederation.

Young ambassadors, youth workers, and coordinators from each partner organization gathered for two days in Malmo, Sweden, to evaluate project actions and present the results of local activities and integrity campaigns from all partners.

Project results were also wrapped up through the activities taken at the Evaluation Course, such as the finalisation of the document of recommendations for the sports sector.

At the evaluation course the participants had presented short overviews and presentation of the local activities that were made in their local communities in: Slovenia, Sweden, Portugal, Lithuania, Austria, Hungary, and Italy.

Short recaps, remarks, challenges, and satisfactory factors were discussed among the present representatives of the teams, going into a deeper overview of the impact of the activities, the spread message of integrity, the reach among the local youth and the experience itself.

On February 28th, the last transnational partners meeting of the Youth Integrity Ambassador Program (YIAP) also took place, happening on the occasion of the YIAP Evaluation Course and Final Conference.

The aim of this meeting was to cover a few important points: to do the final evaluation of the evaluation course results that took place two days before, to have an update on the projects results status and to go through the process of the final reporting and financial matters.

Present coordinators, all involved in the development process of

the YIAP project, stated many positive comments regarding the evaluation course, the idea behind, as well as pointed out the great results of the local activities and the challenges that came with it.

Good part of the discussion went also in sharing improvement ideas for future collaborations.

The partners went also through the status of the project results: the recommendations, toolkit, final video, and communications campaign.

Details regarding the final reporting and final financial matters, were also addressed.

The final partners meeting was concluded in a very positive atmosphere, taking a lot of pride in the results, as well as in the young ambassador's involvement and contribution along the way.

Funded by the Erasmus+ Youth Programme of the European Union, the project ran for 24 months, from May 2022 to April 2024. The YIAP project is led by the European Non-Governmental Sports Organisation (ENGSO) with ENGSO Youth (SWE) and Swedish Sports Confederation (SWE), partnering with EUSA Institute (SLO), Special Olympics Europe-Eurasia Foundation -SOEE (IRL), RF-SISU Smäland (SWE), Portuguese Sport Confederation (POR), Lithuanian Union Of Sport Federation -LSFS (LTU), Organisation for Sports Education - OPES (ITA) and associating partners The European Lotteries.

ENHANCING SPORT ORGANISATIONS AND MANAGEMENT (ESOM)

The ESOM (Enhancing Sport Organisations and Management) project, co-founded by the European Union, was successfully concluded at the end of August, with great realisation results during its timeline along 2024.

Meanwhile, three project meetings took place, as well as many educational events, seminars and roundtables related to the project.

ESOM workshops and seminars were on the topics of: Dual Career, Education of Staff & Volunteers, Engagement & Participation, Event Management & Organisation, Finances & Funding, Good Governance & Policy Making, Marketing & Promotion, Media & Communication, Networking & Partnerships, Safety & Security and Volunteer Recruitment & Management.

On February 2nd, seminar and in-person partners' meeting was hosted by the University Sport Association of Poland (AZS) in Warsaw, where presentations and discussions to share different experiences on the principals'

topics of volunteering and management of sports events were held.

The seminar included a variety of topics, presented, and discussed, such as: volunteer recruitment and management, different types of volunteering within EUSA and the other organisations, volunteering management, importance of volunteering, key points and resources on volunteering.

During the summer, partners of the ESOM project held two meetings. On 14th of July, they met during the European Universities Games in Miskolc, hosted by the Hungarian University Sports Federation, while the conclusive meeting in Zagreb took place on 31st of August during the FISU World Forum, hosted by the Croatian Academic Sports Federation.

Within the project, a round table was organised on Monday, July 22, focusing on the legacy of sports events, as part of the ESOM project, discussing the roles of the institutions and organisations in university and other sports events.

The EUSA Forum, held on 13th of July in Debrecen, on the topic of "Synergies in university sport development", was as well part of the ESOM project.

In August, the last conclusive project meeting of the partners, served as an occasion to go through the general overview and the activities implemented during the project, as well as to share the action plan of the next activities foreseen, before the technical and official closure of the project.

The ESOM project, its activities and results were presented by Hristina Hristova, during the Officials Seminar, part of the FISU World Forum, which was held from 27-31 od August in Zagreb.

ESOM project is led by the EUSA Institute (SLO), in partnership with national university sports associations: Croatian Academic Sports Federation - CASF/HASS (CRO), Hungarian University Sports Federation – HUSF/ MEFS (HUN), Students Sports Association of Montenegro SSAM/USSCG (MNE), Student Sports Association the Netherlands (NED), University Sports Association of Poland -AZS (POL), Sports Students' Union of Ukraine - SSUU (UKR) and the University of Ljubljana -UL (SLO). The project is cofinanced by the European Union.

During the European Universities Winter Championships and EUSA Forum, hosted in the Italian Dolomites – in Val di Zoldo, partners of the Discovering university sport and supporting dual career (DiscoverU) held their kick-off meeting.

The project is led by the EUSA Institute, and brings together two NGOs; besides EUSA, also the European Athlete as Student network (EAS), national university sport bodies from Croatia (CASF/HASS), Hungary (HUSF/MEFS) and Poland (AZS), as well as the University of Salerno.

The 3-year project, co-funded by the European Union, will aim to improve sport and physical activity opportunities for students in higher education on one hand, addressing larger student population; and at the same time promote and support dual career in higher education in partnering countries. This will be achieved by gathering information, sharing good practice examples and implementation of sports and educational activities.

On December 20, the main part of the project meeting was held. The meeting started rounds of introduction and presentation of each partner organisation. Project plans,

timelines and commitments were then presented, with the participants reviewing their roles and responsibilities, as well as proposing some adjustments in the delivery plan of the project.

On 22nd of April, a webinar on the topic of Dual Career was held, as part of EAS Café, this time joined by EUSA on the topic of University Sports – From Active Lifestyles to Dual career. The meeting was hosted by the European University Sports Association (EUSA) and the EUSA Institute, and was attended by around 90 participants, representatives of the partners, national university sport bodies and universities.

The second in-person partners' meeting of the DiscoverU project took place during the 2nd International Scientific Conference for a Healthy Academic Society, organized by the Croatian Academic Sports Federation in Poreč from May 30th to June 1st. The meeting

focused on the project overview, milestones, and final deliverables according to deadlines.

On July 14th in Miskolc, Hungary, at the occasion of the European Universities Games 2024, the second partners meeting was held, with the main goal of sharing the progress of different activities and agree on the next steps and deliverables for the upcoming months.

Prof. Laura Capranica, President of the European Athlete as Student (EAS), presented the objectives of the dissemination and communication plan. She provided advice on best practices for dissemination.

The partners concluded the meeting with a discussion on the various deadlines for implementing deliverables and dividing tasks to ensure timely completion.

Although competitive university sport is not the priority of the

project, it is worth noting that the consortium includes hosts of four European Universities Games: 2016 Zagreb-Rijeka (CRO), 2022 Lodz (POL), 2024 Debrecen-Miskolc (HUN) and 2026 Salerno (ITA); with activities to be held in all partner countries, including the next two upcoming editions next year and in 2026.

YOUTH INDIVIDUAL SPORTS MINDSET (YOUMIND)

YouMind is a small-scale partnership project with the main aim to raise awareness about the importance of mental health in sport and to develop different strategies to prevent mental health issues for young athletes.

The YouMind project kicked off in Ljubljana, Slovenia on 22nd of January with an in-person meeting hosted by EUSA, gathering all the project partners.

At the meeting the partners discussed the first steps, as well as the overview of activities that will be undertaken to realize the projects objectives.

The official part of the program was started with the brief introduction of the topic of the YouMind project, explaining the idea and the development process.

During the meeting all the partners agreed on next steps that will be enforced to meet the expectations of the project establishments. Meeting attendees covered the project's background, overarching objectives, structure, timelines,

and delved into specific tasks such as communication, management, research, project milestones and final evaluation.

The objectives of the project sum up ideas developed jointly with all the partners which will be presented in a form of promotional video and guidelines sharing the best practices with athletes and sport organizations. The project will last two years and will consist of various activities, such as workshops, surveys, and meetings.

The partners had the chance to meet again during online meetings and in Hungary in July during European Universities Games 2024.

The meeting was the occation where the partners reviewed the activities done so far, as well as agreed on the future actions and

gave their own overviews and discussed the workshops, survey and other preparatory steps.

Vincenzo Cusati, a mental coach from CUS Salerno (ITA), presented his approach to helping athletes from a mental perspective. He explained the differences between sports coaching and life coaching, connecting it to personal present life. He also highlighted the crucial role of a mental coach and best practices for building a trusting relationship with athletes, such as avoiding judgment and asking open-ended questions. He concluded by presenting a list of 20 questions for preparing the next workshops. These questions helped partners brainstorm the creation of a questionnaire to better understand athletes' needs and expectations, aiming to tailor online sessions and workshops accordingly.

Within the project, Alessia De Iulis, representing ENGSO Youth, led a workshop on the importance of mental health for young people. The workshops were attended by young athletes, volunteers and participats at the EUG 2024. She provided key information on the prevalence of mental health issues among young people and discussed the benefits of sports for mental health. She also offered strategies for young people to promote mental well-being, emphasizing the importance of ensuring healthy lives and promoting well-being within the grassroots sports sector.

The Fit4Green project, is a 18-month project, with the general objective of raising environmental awareness with the help of sport and physical activity, will bring together university sports organisations' aspirations for more sustainable sport events and educational institutions' need to fight unsustainable consumption practices at campuses.

Fit4Green is lead by the EUSA Institute and co-funded by the European Union, was officially kicked off with a two-day online meeting held on 26th and 27th of June 2024.

The main aims of the project are to raise environmental awareness through sport & physical activity, to promote healthy & eco-conscious lifestyles with young people engagement and to organise green campus campaigns and sport events.

The first day of the kick off meeting was reserved for the individual presentations of the partner organizations, which include EUSA Institute as the coordinator, together with project partners Holztechnikum Kuchl (AUT), University of Ljubljana (SLO), InnovationsManufaktur (GER), NYSA Sweden (SWE) and Latvian University Sports Federation (LAT).

At the meeting, a total overview of the project timeline, work packages, planned activities and general partners roles were given. Divided tasks overview, going hand in hand with the deliverables overview, were as well presented to the partners.

Impact assessment, quantitative indicators and the logistic planning of the meetings that will be held throughout the duration of the project, were discussed. The partners established the communication channels for easier flow of the project matters, as well.

On October 18th, 2024, the first in person meeting of the Fit4Green project was co-hosted by European University Sports Association (EUSA) and University of Ljubljana in the beautiful buildings of the University's Rectorate at the heart of Ljubljana.

During the meeting, the main objectives, finanacial aspects,

risk assesments, communication requirements and future goals were discussed and presented.

As a special guest to this meeting, Lucka Kajfez Bogataj facilitated a lecture about sustainability, and how to organise sustainable events, what to concentrate on, as well as how the events affect the enviroments.

While all six organisations representatives engaged in project detail discussions and presentations, the young participants kicked off the workshop with an escape room challenge to break the ice and get to know each other better.

This meeting served as a point where all participants were part of the co-creation workshop led by Owen Southgate from NYSA Sweden. With this workshop the Cynefin framework was introduced as a decision-making tool designed to help navigate complex problems by offering

different approaches. Using this framework, participants brainstormed innovative event ideas that align with the "Fit4Green" initiative, which focuses on combining sports with sustainability.

On the following day, October 19th, 2024 the group took time to reflect on the proposed ideas, evaluating their approaches and potential impact.

ERASMUS+ YOUTH MOBILITY AND YOUTH WORKERS MOBILITY PROJECTS

Erasmus+ presents an exceptional opportunity to launch projects that promote the mobility of young people and youth workers. Youth Exchanges and mobilities enable diverse groups of young individuals from various countries to come together and participate in meaningful activities for professional development and networking. The implemented projects and activities aimed to offer young people and youth workers opportunities for short-term mobilities to develop skills and enhance youth organizations' capacities.

In the summer of 2024, from July 8 to 19, EUSA Student Commission members from Hungary, Albania, Croatia, Finland, Poland, and Slovenia engaged 39 young volunteers in a youth exchange focused on organizing university sports events. The initiative aimed to empower participants, raise their skills and contribute to organising a large sport event. The opening session fostered a positive atmosphere through icebreakers and discussions, providing also key information about Erasmus+ and different initiatives. Participants led workshops on various topics like Dual Career, Fair Play, Mental Health, and Sustainability.

This activity was supported by the Erasmus+ Programme as a Youth Mobility initiative, co-funded by the European Union. The activities of the Youth Exchange kicked off on July 8, welcoming participants and setting the activities during the programme. The topics of Fair Play, Mental Health and Dual Career got special focus in the programme.

The Fair Play workshops highlighted the role of Fair Play in fostering integrity, respect, sporting excellence, and mental health. Facilitators discussed how practicing Fair Play can build good character, enhance sportsmanship, strengthen team cohesion, and create a supportive community. Challenges such as pressure to win, unsportsmanlike behaviour, and issues related to doping were also explored.

Another key focus of the workshops was on Dual Career, including its benefits and challenges. Participants engaged in discussions about the challenges faced by dual career

individuals, such as prioritizing work over significant personal events. The event concluded with a crossword activity and a discussion on successful dual careers, emphasizing clear goals, a strong support system, and disciplined organization.

In the fall of 2024, the EUSA-FISU Seminar and Convention hosted twenty-six youth workers from Croatia, Czechia, Hungary, Italy, Poland, and Slovenia for three days. The mobility included cooperation with National University Sports Associations (NUSAs) and their members, focusing on enhancing skills and expertise on topics close to the participants, especially event organisation, good governance, funding and networking.

In 2023 and 2024, Erasmus+ Youth Mobility and Youth Workers Mobility projects were led by EUSA Institute (SLO), with partners including CUS Venezia (ITA), Czech University Sports Association (CZE), and Association for University Sport Akademik (BUL).

The initiative kicked off with a five-day learning mobility program during the European Universities Winter Sports Championship and the EUSA Winter Forum in December 2023 in Val di Zoldo, involving eight staff members and twenty youth participants.

During a five-day project in Val di Zoldo, participants engaged in meetings, shadowed the organization of sports competitions, contributing and attending the EUSA Winter Forum, focusing on sustainability in event management.

EUROPEAN WEEK OF WINTER SPORT (EWWS)

The EWWS initiative which main aim is to promote participation in sport and physical activity also in the winter period, while raising awareness of climate change and promoting sustainability, kicked off in Madrid on January 26th, 2024.

This project is co-funded by the European Union, and the concept is made to promote physical activity in winter, making winter sports more accessible and inclusive, as well as raising awareness of climate change and sustainability through winter sports. Activities will be carried out through the period 2024-2026.

Specific objectives and activities are serving as identification of needs, challenges and resources for organizing sustainable sports events in the field of winter sports; supporting sports associations and local authorities in the organization and promotion of events in the field of winter sports during the European Week of Winter Sports (#BeWinterActive week); and raising awareness of climate change and sustainability through the European Week of Winter Sport Week and sport in general.

From 8th to 10th of July, few steps away from the stadium of

Differdange, current football club champion of Luxembourg, the partners of the project European Week of Winter Sport (EWWS) held the second in person project meeting, hosted by the LUNEX University. Under the coordination of L'ORMA, Italian sport club based in Milan, the partners have discussed the status quo and the next steps to be done.

Through the project, local leaders in different countries will be engaged and empowered to act as multipliers, spokespersons and ambassadors for the EWWS initiative. They will involve other people and organisations in the campaign and organise different kind of events during the pilot test of the EWWS in February 2025.

The next project activity was the training in November, hosted by the Ski Club Rijeka. Beside the project presentation, the program was related to the development of competences, attitude, skills

and knowledge useful to boost our network of events organisers.

During this training, different guests and participants presented a practical toolkit for event organisation, engaged in group work, producing and presenting noteworthy results and ideas, as well as analysed the communications strategies of major winter sport events, noting different approaches tailored to different audiences.

The gathering not only provided a platform for collaboration but also fostered networking and laid the groundwork for potential future partnerships. The European Week of Winter Sport project event was a resounding success, setting the stage for an impactful and engaging winter sports initiative.

The cooperation partnership in the field of sport within the Erasmus+ programme brings together 9 entities from 8 countries, with L'Orma from Italy as the coordinator, with partners Bulgarian Sports Development Association from Bulgaria, Sport for Education and Health – DES and Kilian Jornet Foundation from Spain, Ski club Rijeka from Croatia, NEST Berlin from Germany, International University of Health, Exercise and Sports – LUNEX from Luxembourg, European Platform for Sports and Innovation – EPSI from Belgium and EUSA Institute from Slovenia.

The European University Sports Association (EUSA) primarily offers internship opportunities in the EUSA Office through the European Solidarity Corps (ESC) programme and occasionally accepts unpaid voluntary internships as well, but only upon special invitation.

The internship at EUSA is potentially open to individuals aged between 18 and 30, for a set period of time. EUSA has the capability to host international volunteers and/or interns at the same time

The internship is based in Ljubljana, Slovenia. It is not paid, but we provide accommodation, local transportation, and base pocket money for subsistence. Our opportunities and arrangements reflect the ones described in our ESC general profile and project indications. We are especially looking for individuals with some previous skills who are interested in getting more experience and work in the fields of communication and sport management.

In 2024, EUSA had the opportunity to host one Erasmus+ Traineeship intern from Italy and two volunteers

from the Italian Civil Service: Alessandro, Simone, and Giacomo.

Being with us for two short months, Alessandro Boscherini did his internship with us from June to August.

Reflecting on this internship with EUSA, Alessandro said: "During the time with EUSA and during the European Universities Games I met many interesting guys and, probably most important, I had the possibility to network in the work system in which I understood I would like to work on the organization of sports events. I also had the chance to lead some workshops and understand how to manage international projects. Breath of fresh sports air for a guy like me that spent most of his teenage years in a basketball venue is always an emotion and was a pleasure to attend at a so wellorganized event."

On the other hand, Giacomo Mori and Simone De Luca joined EUSA for their 10-month internship supported by the national civil service in Italy in cooperation with the Italian Organisation for Sports Education (OPES).

The programme is designed for young male and female Italian citizens and helps provide them with opportunities to work in the non-profit sector in Italy as well as selected organisations abroad.

Reflection on his 10-month journey with EUSA, Giacomo shared: "Looking back on my 10-month internship with EUSA, it's easy to see how much I've grown, both personally and professionally. I joined EUSA in November 2023, and what followed was a year full of experiences that pushed me to learn new things, work with diverse people, and explore new places. Right from the start, I found myself in a warm,

welcoming environment. The atmosphere at the EUSA office in Ljubljana has always been friendly and collaborative, and I have really enjoyed working alongside my fellow volunteers Simone, Marta, Emanuele, and Heloise, as well as the wider EUSA team."

This is how Simone described his journey with EUSA: "My time at EUSA was truly a special chapter in my life. The 10 months I spent participating in such a great project significantly influenced both my personal and professional growth. Much of this was due to the strong bonds formed from the very first day with the other volunteers who were there during the same period. In my opinion, EUSA was excellent at recognizing and investing in our social potential, giving us the opportunity to constantly grow and believing in our capabilities."

With the goal of inspiring graduates to sustain active, healthy lifestyles post-university, the much-anticipated project Future links for University athletes with Sports clubs Integrating Organised Networks (FUSION) officially kicked off on December 7th, 2024, in the prestigious Rectorate of the University of Ljubljana.

Partners from five European organisations coming from different countries met to discuss important aspects of the project and ensure that the project will be implemented well. Present at the meeting were representatives of the Toulouse University Club (TUC), the Latvian University Sports Federation (LUSF), the Lithuanian Student Sports Association (LSSA), University of Hamburg (UHAM), and the EUSA Institute, established by the European University Sports Association (EUSA).

FUSION seeks to address a growing concern: the decline in sports participation and dropout from sport among young graduates, a trend exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic. By identifying the needs of students and graduates through surveys,

the project aims to engage key stakeholders at networking events and provide practical resources like a podcast series to promote lifelong sports engagement.

The kickoff meeting began with partner introductions, setting a collaborative tone for the day. Markus Schneider, EUSA European Solidarity Corps volunteer, outlined the project's core aspects, ensuring all partners were aligned with the set milestones.

Financial and administrative details, presented by EUSA's Projects and Policy Manager Andrej Pisl, clarified the foundation for implementation. Partners were keen to ask questions and share their ideas and thoughts, showcasing everyone's enthusiasm for the project.

Partner meeting was also attended by EUSA Secretary General Matjaz Pecovnik, whose endorsement of the project underscored its importance within the (university) sports community.

As the FUSION project takes its first steps, the kickoff meeting in Ljubljana has set a strong foundation for its success. By addressing the critical issue of post-graduation sports participation, the project has the potential to make a meaningful impact on the well-being of young graduates across Europe. With upcoming activities like surveys, networking events, and a podcast series, the partners are more than ready to deliver innovative solutions that inspire lifelong engagement in sports. Stay tuned for updates on the

project's progress and upcoming initiatives aimed at empowering graduates to prioritize their health and fitness journeys.

The next time the FUSION Project partners will meet is in June 2025 in an online meeting, discussing the outcomes of the survey which the upcoming networking events are going to be based on.

EUSA MEMBER ACTIVITIES 2024

EUSA's 47 European NUSA members govern university sport, working at local, regional, national, and international levels to empower student-athletes in both their academic and athletic endeavors.

ELECTORAL ASSEMBLIES

In March 2024, at the delegates' meeting of Swiss University Sports in Ittigen b. Bern the new management was elected. For the first time, a co-presidency led by Lorenz Ursprung, director of ASVZ Zurich, and Daniel Studer, Head of University Sports in St. Gallen was formed. They're supported by the newly elected Vice-President Ophélia

Jeanneret, director of Sport Santé UNIL + EPFL in Lausanne.

On March 11th, 2024, the electoral assembly of the Slovenian University Sports Association (SUSA) took place and the new leadership was elected. The new Executive Board comprises the President Klemen Kristan and three Vice-Presidents: Marjan Pucnik, Alen Nikola Rajkovic and Patrik Perosa. At the 1st constitutive session of the Executive Board, Jan Sredensek

was appointed as the Secretary General of SUSA.

At the end of March, the Latvian University Sports Federation (LUSF) in a hybrid General Assembly elected the new management. The presidency will continue to be led by re-elected Agita Abele.

On Thursday, April 25th, the Hungarian University Sports Federation (HUSF) held its General Assembly in Budapest. Mocsai Lajos was re-elected as HUSF President, continuing to lead the Hungarian University Sports Federation focusing mainly on international sports diplomacy and bringing as many international university competitions to the country as possible. The MEFS board was elected for the next four years.

The Estonian Academic Sports Federation (EASL) held its General Assembly on the 24th of May 2024 in Tartu. For the EASL presidency, Marti Viilu and Hendrik Voll competed and as a result of the vote, Hendrik Voll was elected as the new president.

On June 21st, the Italian University Sports Federation -FederCUSI, held its first Electoral Federal in Rome, marking the 1st Electoral Assembly since the change of status into a Federation, Antonio Dima was re-elected as President of FederCUSI. In the Federal Council, Claudio Bertoletti, Giovanni Randisi, Luigi Mazzone, Alice Cometti, Massimo Zanotto, Margherita Mezzetti, Gianluca Bianchi, Pompeo Leone, Rita Piantadosi, and Flaminia Calce were elected.

On the 22nd of June, the University Sports Association of Poland (AZS) held its 30th General Assembly, in the capital city of Warsaw. During this meeting, Prof Alojzy Nowak was re-elected as President of AZS, along with the new executive board members.

On October 16, 2024, during the Sports Students' Union

of Ukraine (SSUU) General Assembly, the elections for the new President, took place. Due to the sudden passing away of Yevgeny Imas in June this year, an extraordinary electoral assembly of the Sports Students' Union of Ukraine was held. At the General Assembly, Andrii Vitrenko, the Deputy Minister of Education and Science of Ukraine, was elected as the new head of the organization that drives student sports in Ukraine.

Portugal University Sports
Federation (FADU) held elections
for its governing bodies on
October 15th, for the 2024-2025
term. On the General Assembly,
Ricardo Nora was re-elected
to the position of President of
FADU. The inauguration of the
elected officials scheduled for
early November 2024, marked
the beginning of a new cycle of
activities and projects focused
on continuing to strengthen
FADU's role both nationally and
internationally.

Kosovo University Sports Federation (KUSF) held the Electoral Assembly on October 18 in Pristina, Kosovo. With a unanimous vote, Musa Selimi was elected to the position of President of the KUSF.

On November 4th, 2024, the 6th General Assembly of the Türkiye University Sports Federation (TUSF) was held in Ankara, and the new president of the federation was elected. With 119 votes out of 184, the Rector of Bayburt University, Prof. Dr. Mutlu Turkmen was elected as the new President of the TUSF for the upcoming term.

On November 24 and 25, 2024, the membership of the German University Sports Federation (ADH) convened in Goettingen for its 119th General Assembly to review the past year, make forward-looking decisions, and hold regular board and committee elections. The ADH General Assembly included scheduled elections for board and committee positions for the

2024 – 2026 term. Delegates unanimously re-elected Joerg Foerster, director of University Sports in Hamburg, as ADH President, beginning his fifth term in this role.

Federation (FFSU) held its
Federal Elections from November
25, 2024, to November 29, 2024,
and re-elected Cedric Terret as
President of the association, with
Lola Charbonnier as 1st VicePresident.

UNIVERSITY SPORTS DEVELOPMENT MEETINGS

On the 6th of February, a delegation from the German University Sports Federation (ADH), visited EUSA headquarters in Ljubljana for a working meeting. The delegation consisted of Thorsten Hutsch (Competition Department and ADH Sports Director), Sophia Kunder (Education Department, Competition Department,











Event Coordinator) and Joshua Feinstein (Board member, student, and Head of Department at Unisport Kaiserslautern). The meeting was initiated with a set of presentations from both organizations and the feedback on the European Universities Championship season of 2023 was given on behalf of both present parties, continuing to plan future collaborations.

On Wednesday, February 7, EUSA President Adam Roczek, EUSA Secretary General Matjaz Pecovnik and EUSA Treasurer Francis Cirianni, were guests of the University of Ljubljana and met with the institution Rector Prof. Dr. Gregor Majdic in the main building of the University -Congress Square, Ljubljana. The meeting follows a long history of partnership between the two entities, since the University has long been the host of the EUSA Office before the actual relocation in 2010, and the academic institution still is EUSA partner of numerous educational projects and sport activities – with the City of Ljubljana itself as stage of various EUSA events in the past. It was a pleasant occasion for strengthening relations and talking about ideas and collaborations for the next future.

On the 23rd of April, a working meeting was held between representatives of the European University Sports Association (EUSA) and the Slovenian University Sports Association (SUSA), at EUSA headquarters in Ljubljana. The working meeting was attended by the newly elected SUSA President Klemen Kristan, SUSA Secretary General Jan Sredensek and EUSA Secretary General Matjaz Pecovnik. At the meeting, representatives from SUSA presented the structure of the National University Sports Association and the foreseen activities and endeavours that will be taken with the newly elected leadership. The meeting also

involved discussion on possible ways to improve collaboration.

EUSA MEMBERS AWARDS

On the occasion of the University of Granada Sports Gala 2024, taking place on September 27th in Granada, Spain, the European University Sports Association (EUSA) received an award as a recognition for its 25 years leading university sport in Europe. Present at the Sports Gala and receiving the award on behalf of EUSA, were Francis Cirianni, Treasurer and Matjaz Pecovnik, Secretary General. Among the awarded people, EUSA Vice-President and Secretary General of the Spanish University Sport Committee Aitor Canibe Sanchez received an award as a recognition of his professional career in sports management, specifically in university sports.

On the invitation of the Armenian Student Sports Federation

(ASSF) Adam Roczek, EUSA
President and Matjaz Pecovnik,
EUSA Secretary General visited
Yerevan to attend the ASFF
Annual General Assembly and
celebration on the occasion of
the ASSF 30th Anniversary. During
the Anniversary Ceremony,
ASSF awarded its members and
partners for their contribution to
the development of university
sports, among them also to
Roczek and Pecovnik.

The Swiss University Sports held its annual awards ceremony evening in Lucerne on 25th October 2024. Numerous guests, including prominent figures from sports and education, gathered to honour the outstanding achievements in university and elite sports. A special spotlight of the event was the presentation of the Lifetime Award to the President of the International University Sports Federation FISU, Leonz Eder, for his outstanding services to university sports, both nationally and internationally.

GALA EVENTS

With a festive academic atmosphere, on the 7th of February, the Croatian Academic Sports Federation celebrated UniSport Stars – the annual sports awards as well as the 30th jubilee birthday of the association. On behalf of EUSA, present at the awarding event were: EUSA President, Adam Roczek, EUSA Secretary General Matjaz Pecovnik, EUSA Treasurer Francis Cirianni and EC Member Andreas Csonka.

Finnish Student Sports Federation (OLL) celebrated its centenary 100th anniversary on Saturday, 13th April 2024 with a Gala at Koskenranta Event Centre, in Helsinki. The celebration brought together secretary generals and chairpersons from previous decades, a great number of OLL alumni, university sports employees, representatives of national exercise and sports organisations and sports influencers from international networks. Among others, present guests and officials were greeted on behalf of Adam Roczek, President of the European

University Sports Association (EUSA) and Fernando Parente, Director of Development and Healthy Campus of the International University Sports Federation (FISU).

On October 23-24, 2024, Warsaw served as the key point for the University Sports Association of Poland (AZS) community, hosting the University Sports Congress and Gala, held at DoubleTree by Hilton Hotel.

This annual celebration of university sport, held at the end of October, highlights athletic achievements, recognizes coaches and universities for their contribution, and awards the organisers of best sports events held in Poland.

The 15th University Sports Gala, organized by the Portugal University Sports Federation (FADU), was held in Viseu, at Pousada Pestana, on November 12th, and brought together the academic and sports community to celebrate the achievements related to the 2023/2024 season.













INTERNATIONAL UNIVERSITY SPORTS FEDERATION (FISU)

2024 was not only a special year for EUSA, but also for FISU, since the International University Sports Federation celebrated its 75th anniversary! And celebration rhymed with transition as Secretary General and CEO Eric Saintrond stepped down after dedicating almost 40 years of his life to developing FISU. His successor is a former student-athlete from Switzerland, Matthias Remund.









The founding General Assembly held on the 1st of June 1949 counts as the official date of FISU's establishment.
This gathering, organised in Zurich under the guidance of Luxembourg teacher and sports leader Paul Schleimer, was attended by several European national university sports associations, with Italy, Austria, Belgium, Luxembourg, Switzerland, and the Netherlands becoming founding members.

Since its creation, FISU has organised five International University Sport Weeks (1949-1947), 62 Winter and Summer University Games (1959-2023), 453 World University Championships and Cups (19632024), 45 World Conferences and Forums (1960-2024), six Young Reporters Programmes, and has been developing the FISU Healthy Campus Programme since 2020 with 164 universities already involved!

Many smiles and a good-bye

This 75th Anniversary was celebrated in the atmosphere of a "family gathering" on 27 November in Lausanne (Switzerland), where FISU has its headquarters after moving from Brussels in 2012.

The date wasn't chosen randomly. It coincided with

the 65th birthday of FISU's Secretary General and CEO, Eric Saintrond, who retired after dedicating almost 40 years of his life to university sports and to the development of FISU. He took the opportunity of the celebrations to say his goodbyes and to pass the baton to the new Secretary General and CEO from 1 December, the Swiss Matthias Remund.

In the meeting rooms, offices and university lecture rooms, the International University Sports Federation has almost been as active as in the sports halls, on the pitches, the ice, or the snow.

A first meeting on the African continent

On 27-28 September, the FISU Executive Committee met for the very first time on the African continent, in the beautiful Moroccan city of Rabat. "FISU is a global organisation and in this light, it is really important that we organise events on all continents," said FISU President Leonz Eder. "We received a very kind invitation from our friends in Morocco to organise our **Executive Committee Meeting** here. I am really impressed with what this country is doing for the university sports movement, and I thank everyone here for their hard work and for their warm welcome."









Dual-Career, Healthy Campus and a consultative partnership with UNESCO

One month before Morocco, the FISU focus was on education at the Zagreb 2024 FISU World Forum. A total of 156 students, speakers, officials, and volunteers from 47 countries all gathered in Croatia for five days of exchanges on the topics of inclusion, diversity and diplomacy. One other topic high on the agenda - in Zagreb but of course also all over the world - is dual career. And FISU is proud to now share on its official website a really useful Dual Career Toolkit for student-athletes, universities,

and national university sports federations.

One other FISU programme that focuses on students is of course Healthy Campus. Born in 2020, the FISU Healthy Campus programme aims to enhance all aspects of wellbeing for students and the campus community at large. Looking to reverse the wellestablished trend of young adults compromising their health during their academic careers, the initiative is already having a positive impact on the lives and lifestyles of university students around the world. Today, 164 universities from around the globe have joined the programme!



This partnership will expand joint efforts to promote sport, physical activity, and healthy living in university communities around the world.

Back to the sports action

As in all even years, 2024 was a year of FISU World University Championships. A total of 22 of them took place, from Ski Orienteering in Lenzerheide (Switzerland) in January to Shooting Sport in New Delhi

(India) in November, where Paris Olympic Games 10m air rifle bronze medallist, Switzerland's 22-year-old Audrey Gogniat, claimed the gold, saying she loved competing amongst other student-athletes. A brand new format was also tested in Brazil: the very first FISU World University Championship Beach Sports, which included beach volleyball, beach soccer, beach handball and beach wrestling on the sand of beautiful Botafogo Beach in Rio de Janeiro.

The sporting year closed with the FISU University World Cup 3×3 basketball in Xiamen (China), which is always an immensely popular event.



As we turn the page of 2024, let's take pride in looking back at all the exceptional FISU athletes who took part in the Paris 2024 Games – including organising committee president Tony Estanguet, who before becoming a three-time Olympic Champion in canoe slalom (in Sydney, Athens and London), won the C1 category at the 1998 FISU World University Championship Canoe Slalom in Metz!

At the Torino 2025 FISU World University Games Winter (13-23 January) and the Rhine-Ruhr 2025 FISU World University Games Summer (16-27 July), inclusion will be central to both events as they will host parastudent-athletes for the very first time in the history of the FISU

Games. In Italy, they will compete alongside able-bodied athletes in both alpine and cross-country skiing, and in Germany, they will impress the crowds in 3×3 wheelchair basketball. Excited? The whole university sports community certainly is!

ASIAN UNIVERSITY SPORTS FEDERATION (AUSF)

Led by its new board, 2024 has seen AUSF make significant efforts toward improving the governance of the organization, providing onsite sports and educational opportunities for Asian youth, and strengthening its collaborations with partners.

Through two Executive
Committee meetings in Zhoushan
and Macau, China, AUSF
successfully restructured its
Commissions and nominated
five Regional Representatives to
optimize the internal structure
of the organization. Additionally,
significant efforts were made
throughout the year by the
Executive Committee members
and external experts to finalize

the Strategic Plan for AUSF's future development.

In 2024, onsite sports events were fully resumed, providing platforms for university students across Asia to engage in sports exchanges and interactions.

AUSF successfully hosted five major events this year: the 6th Asian University 3×3 Basketball Championship, the 2nd AUSF Football Cup, the 1st Asian

University Wushu Championship, the 7th Asian University Men's Basketball Championship, and the 2nd Asian University Archery Championship. These events brought together hundreds of university students from across Asia, allowing them to compete for glory and enrich their university sports experience.

As FISU's qualifying tournaments, the Football Cup and the 3×3









Basketball Championship have become flagship events for both AUSF and FISU, inspiring an increasing number of university students to watch and participate in these sports in recent years. The 2nd AUSF Football Cup, held in Yanbian, China, after a 5-year hiatus, attracted 12 elite university teams from 8 countries and regions. Over the course of the 8-day competition, studentathletes showcased the unique excitement of football and the spirit of youth. Representing Asia, the Women's and Men's Champions—Shanghai University of Sport (CHN) and Kyungil University (KOR), respectivelysecured direct qualification for the 2025 FISU University World Cup Football, which will be held in Dalian, China.

The 6th Asian University 3×3 Basketball Championship took place in Zhoushan, China, from June 11-13, bringing together 15 men's teams and 9 women's teams from 10 countries and regions, all competing for spots in the 2024 FISU University World Cup 3×3 Basketball. The participants showcased their exceptional skills, thrilling the audience with the excitement and charm of basketball. In the end, two teams from China—Guangdong University of Technology (men's) and Yunnan Normal University (women's)—were crowned champions and will represent Asia in the 2024 FISU World Cup 3×3 Basketball, to be held in Xiamen, China.

In addition to the FISU Qualifying Tournaments, the Wushu Championship in Harbin city, Archery and Men's Basketball Championships in Taipei city also achieved similar successes. It is hoped that these events will become regular fixtures on AUSF's calendar, offering more opportunities for Asian university athletes to engage in competitive sports.

Apart from the competitions, participants also took part in the cultural programs that were

held during the various sports events. The specialized topics of each cultural program helped them better understand the local history and local people, and enrich their experiences on the sidelines of the championships. AUSF Championships are not only a pathway to promote sports excellence, but also a platform to enhance learning, sharing and communication.

It was also encouraging to see closer ties being strengthened between AUSF and other continental associations through regular exchanges of visits this year. These collaborations not only enhanced engagement among the federations but also strengthened the friendships between the member federations affiliated with AUSF, EUSA, FASU, FISU America, and FISU Oceania. Additionally, AUSF explored potential cooperation with other sports federations, including the Wushu Federation of Asia (WFA) and the Asian Chess Federation.

This October, AUSF and WFA officially signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) in Macau, China, marking a significant step forward in advancing and promoting the development of Wushu within the Asian university sports community.

In 2025, the 7th Asian University 3×3 Basketball Championship, along with the 13th AUSF General Assembly and Strategic Dialogue, will be held. EUSA delegates and members are warmly invited to join us for these events.

FEDERATION OF AFRICA UNIVERSITY SPORTS (FASU)

As every year, the round up for 2024 in FASU was equally eventful and lively as before. Having a lot of important events, celebrating university sport, and developing it each year more and more, FASU has especially been proud of several highlighted events.

6th AFRO-VARSITY 3X3 BASKETBALL CHALLENGE

The 6th Afro-Varsity 3×3
Basketball Challenge, held in Kampala, Uganda from 27th – 28th July 2024 acted as Africa's qualifying tournament for the FISU University World Cup 3×3
Basketball, bringing together 13 men's teams and 11 women's teams from Seven countries.

Participating Countries were Uganda, Kenya, Egypt, Rwanda, Ghana, Burundi, and Nigeria. This event provided an exciting platform for athletes to showcase their skills and compete for slots at the FISU University World Cup 3×3 Basketball – Xiamen, China | 22nd – 24th November 2024.

The competition brought together 139 participants, including 58 male athletes, 47 female athletes, and 34 officials. Teams represented four key zones of Africa—Northern, Western, Southern, and Eastern Africa.

FASU will be represented by four teams at the prestigious 2024 FISU University World Cup 3×3 Basketball in Xiamen, China.

11th FASU GAMES – Lagos, Nigeria 20th – 29th September 2024

The 11th All Africa University Games, the flagship and premier FASU event, was co-hosted by the University of Lagos and Lagos State University in Nigeria. For 10 action-packed days, the Games featured an impressive 2000+ participants from 60 universities and 13 countries, competing in 12 sports disciplines in both men's and women's categories, including Athletics, Badminton, Basketball, Chess Football, Handball, Judo,

Karate, Table Tennis, Tennis, Taekwondo, Swimming, and Volleyball.

The 11th FASU Games were characterized by vibe a feature very typical of the hosting nation.

The American University in Cairo Head of Delegation received the FASU flag, marking their role as the host for the 12th All Africa University Games in 2026.

2nd FASU Vice Chancellors Forum

The 2nd FASU Vice Chancellors Forum was successfully held on September 21, 2024, at the University of Lagos. This hybrid event brought together respected university leaders and stakeholders to explore the theme: "Empowering University Sports: Pathways to Excellence."

Dr. Decius Chipande from the African Union delivered a thought-provoking presentation on "The University Sports in Africa: The African Union's Perspective", Renowned scholar Prof. Vincent Onywera shared valuable insights on "Strategies for Elevating University Sports Programs"; A panel discussion on "The Value of Hosting Mega Sport Events for Institutional Development" featured top University leaders who had previously hosted FASU Games; A delegation from the Rhine-Ruhr 2025 FISU World University Games provided an informative presentation, offering a glimpse into the upcoming FISU World University Games.

This forum provided a unique opportunity for Vice Chancellors and key stakeholders to engage in meaningful discussions, share best practices, and explored innovative strategies for elevating university sports programs.

5th FISU-FASU-NUSF SEMINAR

The 5th FISU-FASU-NUSF Seminar brought together 129 participants, both online and on-site at the University of Lagos auditorium. Under the theme "Empowering University Sports: Pathways to Excellence," the seminar facilitated a rich exchange of ideas on advancing university sports in Africa.

Key Highlights:

- FISU and FASU programs and projects were showcased, fostering collaboration and knowledge sharing.
- A panel session featuring Presidents of FASU Zones (East Africa, West Africa, Central Africa, and Southern Africa) and a student leader explored strategies to elevate university sports in their respective regions.
- Prof. Mopelola Olusakin,
 Pioneer Director of the
 UNILAG Safeguarding Centre,
 University of Lagos, led a
 thought-provoking discussion
 on "Safeguarding in University
 Sports: Promoting a Culture
 of Safety, Integrity, and
 Inclusion."
- Participants emphasized the importance of prioritizing safeguarding in university sports, recognizing it as a crucial pathway to excellence.

Among the key outcomes we can highlight the strengthened partnerships between FISU, FASU, and NUSF, the enhanced understanding of safeguarding in university sports and the strong identification of strategies to advance university sports in Africa.

By facilitating meaningful discussions and knowledge sharing, the 5th FISU-FASU-NUSF Seminar contributed significantly to empowering university sports in Africa.

FASU INTERNATIONAL VOLUNTEERS, YOUTH LEADERSHIP AND MENTORSHIP PROGRAM

The second edition of the FASU International Volunteers, Youth Leadership, and Mentorship Program gave students an incredible chance to get involved in the FASU Games as volunteers. This opportunity not only allowed them to play a key role in the success of the event but also offered them a chance to learn valuable skills and gain hands-on experience in sports administration and management. Eight international students were selected to join a team of local volunteers as they worked together with the Local

Organizing Committee (LOC) to help manage various aspects of the Games.

IDUS Celebrations

The official continental IDUS celebration were organised in Lagos, Nigeria on September 20th, coinciding with World Clean-Up Day and focusing on environmental sustainability. The celebration brought together students, athletes, and community leaders to raise awareness and take action on pressing environmental issues like waste management and degradation. Participants engaged in clean-up campaigns across various locations, while a workshop session promoted sustainable practices in sports and daily life. By linking sport with environmental responsibility, the event highlighted the important role universities can play in driving global sustainability efforts.

GREEN FASU INITIATIVE:

The Green FASU initiative was introduced and organised by Greenhub in partnership with UNICEF during the 11th All Africa University Games as a sustainability-focused effort aimed at addressing pressing environmental challenges in the context of sports and university communities. This initiative recognizes the significant environmental impact that large-scale sporting events can have, particularly in terms of waste generation and resource consumption.

The initiative sparked a conversation about the role of sports in driving environmental advocacy. It also created a legacy that future editions of the games and other sports events across Africa could emulate, ensuring a balance between sporting excellence and environmental responsibility.

GREEN FASU Recycling Challenge hopes to leverage the FASU sports event to promote sustainable environmental practices and climate change action among African youths.

During the 11th FASU Games athletes were not only awarded medals on the field for their exceptional performance but were also rewarded electronic gadgets for their commitment to sustainability during the games.

FASU Regional Games

Due to the diversity of Africa as a continent FASU has 5 regional associations: North, South, East, West and Central, known as FASU Zones to give opportunities for the students to compete regularly.

In 2024 two regions held their games.

CUCSA Games:

The Southern Africa University Games codenamed CUCSA took place from 7th to 12th July 2024 at the Tshwane University of Technology (Pretoria Campus) and the University of Pretoria (Hillcrest Campus. Students competed in four sporting codes – athletics, netball, football, and table tennis.

EAU Games

The East Africa University Games are scheduled to take place from 16th to 21st December 2024 and will close the 2024 Africa University Sports calendar and are expected to attract up to 3000 participants at Maseno University, Kenya

What is FISU America?

FISU America is the continental sports organization that unites and coordinates the efforts of university sports organizations from every country in America. It represents the region before FISU (International Federation of University Sports).

A memorable 2024

2024 was a year filled with unforgettable moments, with a calendar packed with action:

- FISU America Chess: starting on April 11, this online tournament brought together over 190 student-athletes from 13 countries, showcasing the region's talent and strategy in chess.
- FISU America 3×3: held in Argentina from May 10 to 12, with 17 universities from across the continent participating. In the women's category, Carleton University (Canada) took gold, while ITESM Monterrey (Mexico) earned silver. In the men's category, Universidade Paulista (Brazil)
- claimed first place, and
 Escuela Superior Politécnica
 del Litoral (Ecuador) came
 second. These teams, along
 with ITESM Toluca (Mexico),
 competed in the FISU
 University World Cup 3×3
 Basketball, where Carleton
 University won silver and
 ITESM Monterrey secured
 bronze.
- FISU America Football:
 Uruguay hosted this exciting
 tournament, a qualifier for
 the FISU University World
 Cup Football, from May 22 to
 June 2. The champions were







Universidade Paulista (UNIP) from Brazil in the women's category and Unidades Tecnológicas de Santander (UTS) from Colombia in the men's

- FISU America e-Sports: from September 21 to 28, e-sports took center stage with games like FIFA and Clash Royale. The champions were Daniel de Mattia (Argentina) in FIFA and Wallace Araújo (Brazil) in Clash Royale.
- FISU America Games Cali 2024: from November 5 to 14, the largest university tournament on the continent brought together 17 nations in a framework of respect and competition. This event stood out not only for its organization but also for the exceptional level of its participants—student-athletes who demonstrated that excelling in academics and sports is not only possible but inspiring. Brazil topped the medal table with 110 medals (65 gold), followed by Colombia and Mexico. It was a true celebration of university sports.

Spaces for exchange and dialogue

2024 was also marked by opportunities for discussion and

collaboration on the potential of university sports:

 V FISU America Forum in Cusco: more than 55 Peruvian universities, 90 students, and 60 university sports leaders attended this event, promoting dialogue on the future of university sports in the region.

American NUSF hosted three FISU World Championships

- FISU World University Championship Finswimming: held in Pereira (Colombia) in April 2024, where athletes swam and glided at lightning speed.
- FISU World University
 Championship Cycling: San
 Carlos (Costa Rica) hosted this demanding competition in May and June.

FISU World University
 Championship Beach Sports:
 held in Rio de Janeiro (Brazil)
 in September, where student-athletes showcased their
 excellence and strength on the sand.

Looking ahead to 2025

The year 2025 promises to continue strengthening university sports with events such as:

- FISU America e-Sports: FIFA and Clash Royale remain pillars of the calendar.
- FISU America Futsal: a highly anticipated tournament
- FISU America 3×3: Brasília will be the epicenter of university basketball.
- FISU America combats sports that will be held in Lima, Peru.

- FISU America Tennis: Chile will welcome the continent's best student-athletes for this discipline.
- FISU AMERICA Strategic Dialogue, that will meet leaders of all the continent for University sports.

With every competition and forum, FISU America reaffirms its mission to combine education and sport, proving that both are essential tools for the comprehensive development of young people.

We have also been actively engaged in the global development of university sport via the FISU Development Committee and Education Committee.

Our Green Path

FISU Oceania developed this sustainability strategy to not only reduce our impact on the environment, but to also engage our client groups and stakeholders in climate action and promote climate change action within university sport communities. Our Green Path reinforces the importance we place on this topic and outlines an achievable action plan that underpins our sustainability goals.

New Associate Member – French Polynesia

FISU Oceania welcomed a new Associate Member in 2024, Union du Sport Universitaire Polynesien from the pacific country of French Polynesia. FISU Oceania remains the smallest of the Continental University Sport Federations but we aim to continue to service our members to ensure they can reach their strategic outcomes.

Events

National university sport events

University Games, championships and intervarsity events were held in Australia, Fiji, Guam, New Caledonia, Northern Mariana Islands and Papua New Guinea. Tournaments ranged from head to head events to large university games events. University teams also competed in local leagues in a wide variety of sports.

Over 12,000 students participated in university sport competitions across the region with the following countries awarding overall champions for university sport in their specific country: The University of Sydney (Australia), University of Canterbury (New Zealand) and University of the South Pacific (Fiji).

International Day of University Sport (IDUS)

IDUS activities continue to increase as more students in the region become aware of the day. Held annually on 20 September, IDUS provides a platform to celebrate university sport and its impact on students and the wider university community. Activities across Oceania included:

- Fiji hosted the annual Fiji Inter Tertiary Games in the week of IDUS. Over 3,000 students from more than five universities and other tertiary institutions took part in over eight sporting competitions.
- New Zealand held activities across all eight universities including a successful TikTok promotion implemented by University and Tertiary University Sport.
- Northern Mariana Islands hosted their 5th annual celebration of IDUS involving college students and the community.
- Papua New Guinea's Divine World University hosted IDUS activities including an education program on positive mental health during the morning and a social sport competition held in the afternoon.

University World Cup qualifying events – 3×3

In 2024, FISU Oceania held its 3×3 Qualifying Tournament for the FISU University World Cup 3×3 as part of the UniSport Australia National 3×3 Championships.

University World Cup qualifying events – Football

In 2024, FISU Oceania held its Football Qualifying Tournament for the FISU University World Cup Football.

Oceania student-athletes at FISU World University Championships

Australia and New Zealand were active in sending teams and student-athletes to over 18 FISU World University Championship events in 2024.

Programs and opportunities

FISU Volunteer Leaders Academy (FVLA)

Three Oceania students graduated from the FVLA program in 2024. These students have since taken on leadership roles with their Federation and FISU Oceania as well as working at the campus level to further promote university sport opportunities both locally and internationally. On an annual basis, the European Commission organizes several seminars, meetings and different types of gatherings for sports stakeholders across Europe, including EUSA, to discuss various aspects of sport on the continent.

At the beginning of the year, the European Education and Culture Executive Agency (EACEA) organised a hybrid info day on Erasmus+ Sport and other EU funding opportunities on January 30, 2024 for the current year. The event gathered over 500 participants including the representatives of the European University Sports Association (EUSA) and the EUSA Institute Secretary General Matjaz Pecovnik, with Projects and Policy Manager Andrej Pisl.

On December 16, EACEA organised an additional edition of the Erasmus+ Sport Info Day, for the 2025 call.

The Erasmus+ Sport Info Days have several sessions in plenary form including introduction to the Erasmus+ Sport Programme and sharing practical experiences from existing projects and activities, co-funded by the European Union through the Erasmus+ sport actions in the field of sport; Erasmus+ Sport

Policy priorities; parallel sessions on how to apply for Erasmus+ KA2 sport actions, how to present project proposals, on capacity building proposals and Erasmus+ KA1 mobility of sport staff.

The plenary session during the Info Day in December covered many important topics, among which was on Erasmus+ sport programme, opportunities and experiences. Among the speakers and experts presenting different characteristics and funding experiences from project management, implementation and practical experiences, was Andrej Pisl, Project and Policy Manager of EUSA.

Continuously, around the middle of 2024, representatives of the national coordinating bodies and partners of the European Week of Sport and the #BEACTIVE campaign met online on June 6 for the 2024 Key Players' Webinar. The European University Sports Association

(EUSA) was also represented during the streaming event by Salvatore Sisca, EUSA Head of Media and Communications.

In November, EUSA was represented at the #BeActive Awards ceremony on November 26, celebrated as a hybrid event, with in-person attendance in Brussels, and via online streaming.

The awards were created to support projects and individuals dedicated to promotion of sport and physical activity across Europe. The awards have 4 categories: Education, Workplace, Local Hero and Across Generation Award. From the submitted initiatives, 12 finalists were presented at the awards ceremony – 3 per category.

Besides the awards, representatives of the national coordinating bodies and official partners of the European Week of Sport and the #BeActive campaign met in Brussels. The meeting then focused on the highlights of the 2024 campaign, which engaged over 15 million participants in over 50.000 events, organised in 39 participating countries. The participants reviewed this year's activities, showcasing good practice examples of the European and national campaigns. Participants also contributed to making plans for next year's anniversary 10th edition of the initiative.

COUNCIL OF EUROPE (COE)

European University Sports Association (EUSA) works closely with Council of Europe (COE), where we are members of the Consultative Committee of the Enlarged Partial Agreement on Sport, as well as member of the Conference of International Non-governmental Organisations (INGO).

EPAS – Enlarged Partial Agreement on Sport, a body of the Council of Europe (COE), held its annual meeting of the Governing Board and Consultative Committee in Strasbourg between May 28 and 30, 2024; providing an overview of activities and bringing changes in the elected representatives.

On the 28th of May, the meetings started with updates of the Consultative Committee, and workshops on the topics of refugees and migrants; sport for all; and education, continuing on May 29th with acquainting the EPAS Consultative Committee with the 3 new members joining the body and the elections to the Consultative Committee (CC) Bureau were also held for the next 2 year period.

At this joint meeting, the EPAS Activity report, Factsheets and the Showcasing and Sharing Tool was presented, as well as the update of the changes of the Governing Board and Consultative Committee, Committee of Ministers,

Parliamentary Assembly and Conference of International Non-Governmental Organisations (INGOs) of the Council of Europe. Information on cooperation with the European Union was also presented.

Moreover, initiatives and work on the three pillars of EPAS and information on Council of Europe Convention sport conventions on Anti-doping; Manipulation of Sports Competitions (Macolin); and Integrated Safety, Security and Service (Saint-Denis), were also shared.

Presentations by the national delegations as well as consultative committee members were done of their activities and good practices on the following themes, related to the European Sports Charter: Human Rights; Sport for All; Sustainability; Migrants and Refugees; and Education. On behalf of EUSA, the organisation work and projects were briefly presented by Andrej Pisl, Projects and Policy Manager.

Few months later, the 18th Council of Europe Conference of ministers responsible for sport was held in Porto, Portugal between October 8 and 10, 2024, attended by EPAS Governing Board members and Consultative Committee, including the European University Sports Association (EUSA).

Distinguished array of experts and speakers led the participants through major achievements in the field of tackling sport manipulation over the past decade, followed by sessions on different topics, such as: obstacles faced and challenges overcome, future perspectives and emerging opportunities, youth initiative roundtable, and collaborative governing.

20 Youth delegates, nominated by the EPAS member country representatives, as well as by the members of the Consultative Committee took part in the event, symbolising the importance of youth also in policy making. EUSA nominated Klea Taipllari, member of the Executive Committee and Chair of the Student Commission, who attended the conference and its activities as well.

Delegates of the 18th Council of Europe Conference of Ministers responsible for Sport also adopted a special resolution on collaborative governing and good governance in sport, supporting a fresh approach to match its societal importance.

Last day of the conference was held on October 10, with focus sessions on Leadership through Gender Equality in Sport; and on Dual Career: Effective Strategies and Future Directions.

The event was closed by a summary and thanks to the hosts and speakers by Sophie Kwasny, Head of the Council of Europe's Sport Division, Executive Secretary of EPAS.

EUROPEAN FAIR PLAY MOVEMENT (EFPM)

The European Fair Play Movement (EFPM) is a non-governmental association promoting fair play and tolerance in sports and everyday life across Europe. It supports its members, promotes fair play campaigns, cooperates with authorities, and facilitates networking among European sports organizations.

The European University Sports Association (EUSA) and its Institute have long been at the forefront of promoting clean sport, fair play, and ethical competition across Europe. Beyond organizing sports events, EUSA actively provides educational opportunities to raise awareness about the importance of these values. Notably, this was reflected in the Fair Play workshops organized at the European Universities Games in Debrecen and Miskolc.

As an official partner of the European Fair Play Movement (EFPM), EUSA is dedicated to upholding the core values of fair play, integrity, anti-doping, and equality across all its programs. This strong partnership is part of EUSA's broader commitment to ensuring that fair play is not just a concept, but a practical approach embedded in all sports and educational initiatives.

World Fair Play Day and EFPM Awards 2024

The 5th World Fair Play Day and the 2nd EFPM "Fair Play for Peace" Award Ceremony took place in Brussels from October 21 to 24, 2024. This event marked a significant milestone for the fair play movement, celebrating the efforts of individuals and organizations dedicated to promoting fairness in sport.

A key feature of this year's World Fair Play Day was the launch of the initiative "Crossing Europe for Fair Play and Peace", a symbolic relay that traversed Europe. The initiative aimed to bring together athletes, students, sports enthusiasts, and advocates of fair play from across the continent, uniting them around the message that fair play is for everyone, every day, and everywhere.

EFPM Congress

Following the World Fair Play Day celebrations, the EFPM Congress 2024 took place in Mardin, Türkiye, under the theme "Fair Play Education to Overcome Violence, Bullying, and Cheating in Sport." The Congress emphasized the crucial role of fair play education in preventing abuse and fostering ethical behavior in sport. Over 350 participants attended the event, including key figures such as Philippe Housiaux, President of EFPM, Tuncay Akkoyun, Governor of Mardin and Mehmet Samsa, Chairman of the Organizing Committee.

Celebrating 30 Years of EFPM

In addition to the EFPM Congress and Awards, the EFPM also celebrated its 30th anniversary during its annual general assembly, which was held online on May 27, 2024. The assembly commemorated the organization's significant contributions to the promotion of fair play and ethical standards in sport over the past three decades. Andrej Pisl, EUSA's Projects & Policy Manager, represented EUSA at the event, extending congratulations to EFPM on its milestone anniversary.

EUROPEAN ORGANISATION FOR GRASSROOTS SPORT (ENGSO) & ENGSO YOUTH

ENGSO, the leading voice for voluntary grassroots sport in Europe, is a non-profit organization representing National Sport Confederations and National Olympic Committees from 34 European countries. Its youth arm, ENGSO Youth, focuses on the sport-for-all sector for young Europeans under 35 in over 30 countries.

In 2024, EUSA was represented at a few events organised by ENGSO and ENGSO Youth, supporting, learning, and affirming the already great, established, and fruitful collaboration between the two organisations.

Back in April, the European Summit on Gender Equality and Diversity in Sport was held in Brussels, organised by the ENGSO member Opes International within the framework of the project Sport and Equality, which is co-funded by the European Union.

The meeting gathered all major European sport stakeholders committed to improving equality in sport: the Sport Unit of the European Commission, Council of Europe EPAS, European Olympic Committees – EOC and European Olympic Committees EU Office – EOC EU Office, Global Observatory for Gender Equality & Sport, EUSA – European University Sports

Association, EGLSF, Leap Sports Scotland, and International Working Group of Women in Sport (IWG). All of the present representatives shared a scoop of their most important actions taken as well as future plans and actions to be implemented in the future.

Later on in the year, ENGSO held its 32nd General Assembly, hosted by ENGSO member Sport Austria, in Vienna from 14-16 June 2024. On the same occasion, the 21st ENGSO Youth Assembly, EU seminar, and ENGSO seminars on Equality and Sport were held.

ENGSO welcomed five new member organisations, increasing its membership to 38 National Sport Federations, National Olympic Committees and European Sport Organisations. The General Assembly also approved updates to the ENGSO statutes, making ENGSO more inclusive and

open to new memberships and opportunities.

At the events, EUSA was represented by EUSA Student Commission Member Franciska Coko.

In November, under the theme of "Values of sport: building bridges in a united Europe", the 2024 European Sport Platform was an opportunity to shape the future of European grassroots sport while discussing and exchanging experiences on how to equip organisations and clubs in analyzing how our society can advance thanks to values such as integrity, equality, and good governance in sport. It was also the occasion to unite and strengthen the European grassroots sport movement and discuss the role and impact of sport in building stronger communities and more peaceful societies also through the promotion of EU values.

The event started with the Sports as Value final conference built around the Erasmus+ funded project Sports as Value, which offered research and insightful discussions about Balkan grassroots sport and the importance of integrating European values within it with a goal of building more peaceful societies in a historically fragmented region.

The workshops that followed discussed trending issues, including integrity in sports, the prevention of match-fixing within European sports, and the safeguarding of young people's mental health, the lasting legacy of major sporting events, human rights and equality, and the role of cities in inspiring healthier and active communities.

EUROPEAN ATHLETE AS STUDENT (EAS) NETWORK

The European Athlete as Student (EAS) network was founded in 2004 with support of the EU Commission during the European Year of Education Through Sport (EYES), with the aim of supporting European athletes in combining high performance sport and education.

The European Athlete as Student (EAS) dual career network hosted its annual Conference and General Assembly in Katowice, Poland, from October 1-3, 2024, at the Academy of Physical Education (AWF). The event brought together experts, researchers, and stakeholders to discuss the challenges and opportunities in balancing sports and academics.

The conference opened with key lectures from distinguished speakers, including Adam Zajac on AWF's legacy as a "School of Champions," Izabela Pelczynska on Erasmus+ funding for dual careers, Bill Thompson on FISU's global approach to dual careers, and Antonio Tessitore on the collaboration between EAS and ENSE.

A highlight of the event was the presentation of the Bengt Nybelius Scholarship Award to Flavia Guidotti for outstanding research in dual careers. The celebration continued with a tribute to EAS's 20th anniversary, reflecting on its history and major achievements.

Subsequent sessions featured presentations on university-level dual careers and European projects, with insights shared by experts and organizations, including Andrej Pisl from the European University Sports Association (EUSA), who introduced the DiscoverU project.

A dynamic panel discussion on "Sport in School and University," chaired by Piotr Rodak, featured Olympians and academic leaders, including Weronika Nowakowska, Marianna Pikul, Krzysztof Wilusz, and Maciej Wyderka. They provided firsthand perspectives on the importance of structured support for student-athletes.

The EAS General Assembly reviewed the organization's activities, finances, and future initiatives, led by EAS President Laura Capranica, Treasurer Mojca Doupona, and Executive Committee member Ole Keldorf. The event concluded with discussions on national and institutional approaches to dual careers.

Next year's EAS Conference and General Assembly will take place in Zagreb, Croatia, hosted by the Croatian Olympic Committee.

EUROPEAN POWERLIFTING FEDERATION (EPF)

The European Powerlifting Federation and the European University Sports Association (EUSA) have developed the collaboration with the signage of the official Memorandum of Understanding, four years ago on September 20, 2020.

European University Sports Association (EUSA) Sports Manager Miha Zvan, Sports Coordinator Eszter Gulyas and Sports Administrator Aleksandra Andreeva held a working meeting with the representatives of the International Powerlifting Federation (IPF), Emanuel Scheiber, General Manager and European Powerlifting Federation (EPF) Tetiana Melnyk, Secretary

The representatives of EUSA and IPF/EPF continued with the fruitful dialogue of the past years about the future cooperation, in particular by expanding on

the ongoing discussion about the possibilities to include Powerlifting in the program of the EUSA European Universities Championships.

The discussion explored in details the possibility of creating the first joint EUSA-EPF European Universities Powerlifting Championship.

As an effective result of the ongoing conversation, the European Universities Championship in Powerlifting will debut on the EUSA sports program in 2027.

Bids to host the event are still being accepted.

EUROPEAN UNIVERSITIES CHAMPIONSHIPS 2025

The year of 2025 promises to be another busy year for European Universities Championships, with events held in various cities across Europe. Student-athletes will have the opportunity to compete, achieve victories, and gain valuable EUSA sports experiences.

The first one to host and to open the European Universities Championship season in 2025 will be the **Badminton** competition, set to be held in Madrid, Spain from June 22 – 28. After the successful edition held in Miskolc in 2023, this event will get its spotlight in the capital of Spain. Badminton university athletes will be able to compete for new medals, while enjoying the Spanish culture and all the beautiful sights and venues that this city can offer.

From Portugal in 2023, the EUC in Basketball is moving to the neighbouring country of Italy, in Bologna. Many cities in Italy have been hosts of different Championships but this will be the very first hosting experience for the capital and largest city of the Emilia-Romagna region in Northern Italy. Many student athletes will travel to Bologna to play and get a place on the triumph podium, competing in one of the oldest sports, from 6 to 13 of July. Having the oldest university in the western world, stunning architecture, buzzing population, and being considered the gastronomic capital of Italy, Bologna will be a great host for the EUC Basketball in 2025.

The EUC **Water Polo** will be held in Vukovar, Croatia. Vukovar, a town of around 27 thousand inhabitants, located in the northeast part of Croatia, at the border with Serbia across the Danube River, will be the first-time host of an European Universities Championship, from the 7th to the 13th of July.

After the successful championships in Beach Handball and Beach Volleyball in 2023, organised on the beautiful beaches in Malaga, Spain, the competition in 2025 will not travel far away for the new edition. The beaches of Granada

will be the hosts of these two championships from July 14-19. The 73 km of beaches along the coast of Granada will offer their sand, great weather and atmosphere during these two competitions.

The EUC in Futsal, is not changing the hosting country but just the hosting city. From being organised in Split in 2023, is now moving in the organizational hands of the capital of Croatia and University of Zagreb. Zagreb and Croatia in general are a multiple time host of EUC throughout the years, so we believe that again this city will be an amazing place where Futsal athletes will have the opportunity to win another title, gain new friends and create new memories. From 17 to 25 of July, the European Universities Championship in Futsal will be in the spotlight.

With the hosting location for the 2023 championship in **Rugby 7s** being in Portugal's hilly, coastal capital city of Lisbon, in 2025, the leadership might be in the hands of the city of Ankara, Turkey, in partnership with Bilkent and ME Technical University. The EUC Rugby 7s in 2025 is foreseen to take place from 21 to 24 of July in Ankara, Turkey.

From Podgorica, Montenegro the EUC in Handball will travel to Covilha, Portugal in 2025. Described as a quite original example of a "mountain city", rare in Portuguese urbanism with the expression of a vast industrial tradition based on modern and contemporary times, this city sounds like a great hosting place for the many handball competitors, not just to conquer new victories but to also have a great time celebrating them. From 22 to 28 of July, Covilha is looking forward to being a host of a European Universities

Championship, for the very first

From the great terrain in Switzerland, where the EUC in **Orienteering** took place in 2023, the competition is now moving to Lodz, Poland from the 24th to the 27th of July.

After the European Universities Championship 2023 in Football, organized in Tirana, Albania, the next host for this Championship is Camerino, Italy, where the teams will be hosted by University of Camerino. In the small town in the centre of the Marche region of central Italy, the teams will be playing and chasing victories from the 27th of July to the 3rd of August.

During the same period, other student-athletes will also be competing at the European Universities Volleyball Championship. After the beautiful city of Braga in Portugal we are moving to the capital of Hungary, Budapest. The capital and the most populous city of Hungary along with the University of Physical Education of Budapest, will offer their city venues and will make sure a great atmosphere will be following the championship, from the 27th of July until 3rd of August.

Starting from July 28^{th} until August 3rd the European Universities Championship in Tennis and Padel will be ongoing. The multiple times host in the past, the city of Coimbra will be hosting one new sport, Padel and one veteran sport Tennis. On the banks of the river Mondego, Coimbra is famous for its university, the oldest in Portugal and one of the oldest in Europe, which over time has shaped its image to become "the city of students", making this city the perfect hosting location for these two sports. During these

days, Coimbra will be offering days full of sport, youth and fun.

When we are talking about the great experience with organizing European Universities Championships in Zagreb, we are also talking about the hosting city of Combat Sports Championships in 2019 and 2023. However, this time the honour of being the hosting place for the athletes competing in karate, kickboxing, taekwondo and judo, will belong to Warsaw, Poland. We have no doubts that this city will organise an amazing combat sports championship from 22nd to 25th of August.

To continue the story of EUC Table Tennis, with lastly being organised in Olomouc, Czech Republic in 2023, the honour of having the heat of the matches, the glory of the victories and celebration of the best will this time go in the hosting hands of the city of Burdur in Turkey and the Burdur Mehmet Akif University. From 11 to 16 of September, the athletes competing in Table Tennis will be enjoying their time and fighting for the medals in this city in southwestern Turkey, located near the eastern shore of the beautiful Lake Burdur.

The European Universities Champion in Chess, after skipping its presence on the program in 2023 and lastly being organised in Budapest, Hungary in 2019, is now continuing its path to Yerevan, Armenia. Yerevan as the capital and largest city of Armenia and one of the world's oldest continuously inhabited cities and the leading hand of Armenian State University of Economics are looking forward to organising the European Universities Championship in Chess, from 16-20 of September 2025.



After the great Rowing championship held in Zagreb in 2024, this competition is coming back to Bydgoszcz, Poland, where it was initially organised in 2023. Looking forward to another successful European Universities

Rowing Championship that will be held from September 18-21.

Following Debrecen's successful 2023 event, Salerno, Italy, will host the 2025 European Universities 3×3 Basketball Championship, from August 1-5.

The second edition of the European Universities Winter Championships is going back to Val di Zoldo, as it was in 2023.

On this occasion, the Organizing Committee proposed to organize the European 3×3 Basketball Championships between the end of July and the beginning of August 2025 as a test event for the EUG 2026 at the University of Salerno.

EUROPEAN UNIVERSITIES GAMES SPLIT 2028

There are many associations when you think of Croatia. Still, some of the most common are its beautiful Adriatic coastline and its sports successes, contributing to its global recognition.





The country of 3.8 million, located on the crossroads of central, southern, and southeastern Europe won 52 Olympic medals since Croatia gained independence in 1991. Croatian side of the Adriatic includes 1246 islands attracting millions of visitors yearly, and beautiful coastal Dalmatian cities like Split, Dubrovnik, Trogir, Sibenik, and Zadar proudly display its UNESCO World Heritage sites. Croatia has ten sights inscribed on the UNESCO World Heritage list, seven located in the Dalmatia region, the birthplace of the independent medieval Croatian kingdom, and the center of Eastern Adriatic since ancient times.

Split is an academic center, with the University of Split being the second-largest national academic institution with more than 20, 000 students, 11 faculties, one academy, and four departments. Sports play an important role at the university, with many sports and recreational activities provided for students. The city of Split itself has hosted five EUSA championships so far: Basketball in 2013, Beach Volleyball, Sports Climbing, and Basketball 3×3 in 2017, and Futsal in 2023, while for the last twenty years, it has hosted the International University Rowing Regatta Sveti Duje with the world's most famous crews from University of Oxford and Cambridge participating regularly.

Croatian Academic Sports Federation and Split University Sports Federation

The Croatian Academic Sports
Federation is the umbrella
organization of university sports
in Croatia. The federation has
23 members and organizes the
sporting part of life for about
180,000 students from all higher
education institutions in the
Republic of Croatia, which makes
us one of the biggest sports
systems in Croatia.

The University of Split has one of the most developed university sports systems in Croatia and

Europe, with excellent growth potential in years to come. Around 5,000 students from Split participate in university sports programs, including competitions in 16 sports and UniSport Health, free health-enhancing physical activity programs.

Inspiration, motivation goals and legacy of EUG Split 2028

The last major investment in sports infrastructure in the City of Split was in 1979 when most sports facilities were built for the Mediterranean Games. For this reason, both the City of Split and the University of Split see hosting the European Universities Games in 2028 as an excellent opportunity to upgrade sports and university infrastructure standards. The legacy of the Games is divided into two key segments: local infrastructure (City of Split projects) and university infrastructure.

Hosting the Games aligns with the goals of establishing a systematic approach to managing sustainable sports and university accommodation infrastructure. Through hosting EUG 2028, we want to:

- Leave a lasting legacy by upgrading and developing sports infrastructure that benefits both the university community and the broader public, contributing to longterm sustainability
- Accelerate investments in the university accommodation and infrastructure that will serve as a basis for raising student standard and quality of student life for future generations

Healthy Lifestyle Promotion

The Games will be a powerful tool to promote health-oriented physical exercise and leverage the promotional values of sports.

Volunteerism and Community Engagement

The event provides a platform to engage the entire community, especially young people, athletes, and students, fostering their interest in sports





and encouraging grassroots development programs.

Environmental Sustainability

Environmental sustainability has become one of the key themes of international policies in sports, specifically when it comes to hosting large–scale sports events. We want to contribute to a global effort to promote a healthier planet and create a legacy that goes beyond the event itself.

Education and Inclusion

Social, cultural, and academic programs have significant importance when hosting the Games. Providing educational opportunities alongside the event fosters a positive knowledge change, contributing to a more informed and tolerant global community.

Mental Health

The well-being of the mind and engagement in sports go hand in hand. Our approach involves using Games to break down the stigma surrounding mental health, highlighting how crucial mental well-being is for athletes to excel in sports. Simultaneously, we aim to reinforce the significance of sports in an individual's life. showcasing it as a pathway to both maintain and attain mental health. This initiative will build upon the YouMind project (Youth Individual Sports Mindset) that EUSA commenced in January 2024, whose goal is to raise awareness about the importance of mental health in sports and to develop various strategies

aimed at preventing mental health issues for young athletes.

Split 2028 will be about something other than hosting a 15-day multi-sport event. In partnership with EUSA and national kev stakeholders, we want to use Split 2028 as a short-term event for a long-term impact. We want to go beyond sport and impact the everyday lives of current and future generations. Investments in new student dormitories and new university infrastructure, volunteers and leadership programs, sustainability, and environmentally friendly Games will be just some of the key highlights of our legacy program. Our inspiration provides us with our vision that the European Universities Games will not be just a sporting event but also one of the most significant social and academic events in Europe in the year 2028.

EUROPEAN UNIVERSITIES GAMES The Organising Committee (OC), led by the University of Granada, is already preparing the city and itself for this event with several promotional actions, all of them around its mascot, the jovial VIVA.

As part of the European Week of Sport 2024 (SED'24), from 23 to 30 September, several activities were organised around the slogan "#VIVActive". During the eight days of SED'24 there were masterclasses of various activities (zumba, kung-fu, aerobox, etc.), open days of the university sports facilities, presence at the reception of students of the University of Granada and introduction to students between 6-12 years of age from schools near the facilities of the Fuentenueva campus, of the sports modalities

The 2030 European Universities Games will be held in Granada, Spain, marking a return to the Andalusian region that hosted the inaugural 2012 games. Granada is set to host

the 10th European Universities Games in 2030, aiming to

of handball, tennis, rugby and volleyball.

During this European Week of Sport, other important events were also held, such as the National University Basketball Cup and the University of Granada Sports Gala.

The University Cup was the first competitive university event organised by the University of

Granada used as a promotional event for the EUG2030. This event was attended by the four best Spanish universities in basketball, both in the men's and women's categories.

Additionally, the University of Granada Sports Gala, in its first edition, recognised the best university athletes of the year, as well as the promising athletes of its sports schools; athletes, coaches and judges, Olympic and Paralympic athletes from Granada who participated in Paris 2024: Aitor Canibe, for his career in university sports management; and EUSA, for its 25th anniversary leading university sport in Europe. In the same ceremony, awards were also granted to the overall winners of the University of Granada's internal competitions.

During the National Conference on University Sport held in Cuenca (7 and 8 November), the OC presented the EUG2030 to the Sports Directors of the Spanish universities, focusing on the whole process of preparing the bid for the Games, the yearly calendar of preparatory events until 2030, and the events that have been established on a

regular annual frequency as promotional events for the Games.

As part of the annual activities, the Granada 2030 logo has been advertised on different promotional elements of the events that have already taken place since the Games were attributed to Granada, all of them with a high level of participation. Firstly, in the University-City of Granada Race held on 9 and 10 November. There were different categories of participation, with ages between 4 and 18 years old, covering distances from 200 m to 3 km, and a distance of 10 km for those over 18 years old.

As a celebration of the International Day of Persons with Disabilities, on December 3rd and 4th, the "Include VIVA" event took place. Groups and associations working for and with people with disabilities, through sport, gave visibility to this group and raised awareness among the general public that sport is open to all, as will be the case of the EUG2030 with two paralympic sports as part of its sports programme.

As a second target of the Organising Committee (OC), in

a short, medium and long term project, it is already working on the recovery, renovation or new construction of sports facilities where the institutional allies involved in these games such as Conseio Superior de Deportes (NUSA), Junta de Andalucía (Regional Government), Diputación and Ayuntamiento de Granada (local regional government) and the University of Granada are already providing funds and undertaking new works, such as the remodeling of the 50m swimming pool and the construction of the new Beach Sports Facilities, both infrastructures located in the Fuentenueva University Campus.


